Why speaking and listening?

- Children with excellent verbal and listening skills do better generally in school
- Confident speakers are better writers
- The brain makes meaning through repetition and emotional context
- Practice makes permanent!
- Talking helps with memory retention
- If you are not listening, you are not communicating
- Listening is a top 21st skill employers seek
- Listening to academic vocabulary used correctly is an important step to gain confidence
- Understanding is the goal of listening

The importance of listening



A good speaker has these qualifies...

- Uses good vocabulary
- Makes eye contact with the listener
- Is clear about what they mean
- Makes a longer contribution than just one or two words
- Uses facial expression and gestures
- RASA
 - Receive, Appreciate, Summarise, Ask



A good listener has these qualifies...

- Makes eye contact with speaker
- Listens carefully
- Asks relevant questions
- Responds appropriately



Turns off distracting noises such as music and television



Speaking and listening across the curriculum at BSB

Children are encouraged through focused activities to...

- Think about what they say
- Choose the right words
- Listen to others respectfully before they speak
- Talk to others
- Share ideas
- Use words to settle conflict
- Is embedded through all subjects

Talk for Writing at BSB

Talk for Writing is used across year groups

- Part of our English curriculum
- Allows children to imitate language
- Once language is acquired about topic, children can use it to base their own writing
- Can be adapted for different genres of text through meaningful use of oral work before writing begins

Story building process explained

• Imitation stage



- Children use actions to help retell stories and texts
- Innovation stage
 - Developing story maps, extending and changing elements
- Invention
 - Creating a new story and text





How can you help?

Activities you can do with your child to support their language

- Use news on Firefly to talk to your child about school and what they learned
- Ask about how they are feeling
- What they like
- Events and upcoming plans
- Something in a book
- Ask questions
- Be a good role model at speaking and listening
- Teach your children rhymes, stories and songs
- Books on CD
- Take turns in conversations with them and encourage them to listen to you.
