Dear All,

At this time of year, you will have just received reports about the progress of your children in school. Our teachers have worked hard to raise the standards of attainment across the board. Having read every report for the students at Madinat Khalifa, there is a real indication that our staff know the children well and are able to paint a realistic picture of their strengths as well as their areas for improvement. We hope that you find this feedback useful and that you too feel it is a fair reflection of their work in school.

A while ago, parents completed the annual school survey. I am very pleased to report that significant progress has been made in all areas and whilst this is encouraging, like our students, we know that we still have some areas that require further improvement. We will be analysing the results in depth over the summer break and developing an action plan to share with staff and with members of our newly formed Strategic Advisory Board. Once this is complete, we will share this plan with parents early in the new academic year. We are determined to move forwards to make our school better, year on year, and never to be complacent about prior achievements.

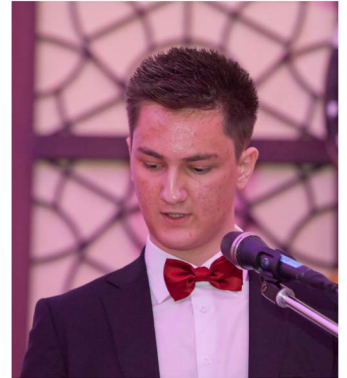
