

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BREATHING NEW LIFE

This year Regents welcomes two new Heads of school into our family – Mr Grant Gillies, Head of Primary and Mr Michael Seaton, Head of Secondary. With impressive CVs, they both bring a wealth of knowledge and expertise, fresh ideas and a contemporary outlook.

Grant Gillies comes to us from Scotland, where he was Head Teacher at Dalry Primary School in Edinburgh which was named the 'Most Creative School in Scotland '.

Impressions of Thailand? *My family and I have settled in quite quickly and are enjoying the rural setting, the beautiful countryside, the views and sunshine and sensory experience of it all. My wife and children have been a great support at home. It is a team effort and we are embracing new experiences and meeting other cultures.*

First impressions of Regents? I have come from a setting where 75% of students were from outside Scotland, so I am enjoying the international diversity of our campus here too. The students are very well rounded and self-motivated. I eat with the children every day and am getting to know them. I was impressed that one third of students play a musical instrument - it is inspiring.

Your role models, and why? I was brought up on a farm where we enjoyed the outdoors and simple honest living. I was inspired to become a teacher after visiting a successful school for work experience and have been lucky enough to work with people I admire. Matt McIver the Headteacher at one of the first schools I taught at was a quiet, commanding presence who observed a lot of things and was well respected because of it. **Worst memory of school?** I thought my first experience of being an acting head teacher was a disaster but it taught me what I needed to do this job. I went on to study my Masters and learn from my mentors around me. Choosing this career path has been my greatest achievement. You have to love teaching to do this job.

Best memory/what should excellent schools aim to do?

I have always enjoyed learning and want to encourage children to be ambitious, inquisitive and self-reflective. We should teach children to have a sense of integrity – to try their best and care for each other and the world around them. They do this naturally as well.

Describe your leadership style in a tweet. *Empowering. Everyone has a role to play in raising a Regents child.*

What do you do for fun/relaxation? I have bought a guitar and am learning to play it. I love socialising, talking to people, travel, scuba diving and creative writing.

How have you found working with Michael? It's a marriage made in heaven! We have very different approaches – he is more meticulous at planning and detail – but we get along well. We meet weekly and are supporting each other's strengths, and we agree on a lot about how to take things forward.

Originally from the UK, Michael Seaton was Head of Senior School at Brighton College Al Ain, where he was integral to building a start-up school into the highest ranked school in the United Arab Emirates in three years.

Impressions of Thailand? It's a warm and hospitable country and it is wonderful to be surrounded by awe-inspiring natural beauty. My family and I have settled into our new home really well. It could not be more of a contrast to the desert sands of the UAE, although both are beautiful places to live.

First impressions of Regents? Aside from the world-class facilities, the strength of Regents is in its excellent teaching body and the students. The behaviour of our young people around the campus is exemplary and we value the quality of the relationships between the children and the adults who care for them. Schools are about relationships. Our school is unique in having some meaningful community ties and so many opportunities for personal as well as academic development.

Your role models, and why? My father, because he fused an incredible work ethic with love and compassion for his family. Like many doctors, he also had an excellent 'bedside manner': it could sometimes be difficult to work out what he was actually thinking! I also admire people who strive to change the world for the better.

Worst memory of school? *Receiving a school report in Primary School, and the teacher spelt my first name wrong! Experiences like this have built my firm belief in individualisation – it is vital that teachers know their students incredibly well and school should cater for every child's abilities.*

Best memory/what excellent schools aim to do? *I benefited from a wide arrange of co-curricular activities and the opportunity to explore drama and music – a premium school should cater for the whole child and should be about lifestyle as well as lessons.*

What do you do for fun/relaxation? I am an avid reader and am a particular fan of the novels of Ian McEwan. He is a quintessentially English writer, so reading a McEwan novel is a wonderful way to keep in touch with my roots.

How have you found working with Grant? *Mr Gillies is a highly creative educational leader and the Primary School is lucky to have him. We have a very positive working relationship and, although very different, share the same goals for Regents to become one of the best schools in the wider region.*

REGENTS LITTLE LIONS

As our Little Lions programme evolved over the first half term, we received some wonderful feedback; "lots of equipment, messy play, space to run around in"; "the teacher is warm, welcoming and has an incredible talent to pass her positive energy on to people (and especially the children!)".

To build on this momentum, we are delighted to announce an extension of the programme after Christmas to include swim confidence lessons, gymnastics for toddlers and toddler massage. This is in addition to the existing outdoor environment offering.

The massage component, which will be delivered by a professional reflexologist, is designed to enhance the children's wellbeing through skinship and songs. It creates relaxing time to nurture the intimate relationship between the parent and the child which is essential for the child's emotional, social, physical and language development

REGENTS SEA LIONS

This is another new initiative where parents are invited to use the trainer pool with their children and receive early swimming tuition from qualified staff. Swimming is an integrative movement activity that is vital to the learning process. Swimming not only helps to develop muscle tone, coordination, balance and gravitational security, but also eye movement control for reading, fine motor skills for writing, spatial awareness needed for math, cross patterning movements needed for reading, writing, spelling and math.

NAPPIES? NO PROBLEM!

Initiatives continue in our Pre-Nursery area as, also after Christmas, we will offer full time places to children from 2 years old who are still in nappies. (Some conditions do apply.)

FOUNDATIONS LAID FOR AN OUTSTANDING ACADEMIC YEAR

The 2016-17 academic year is off to a most promising start at Regents, with news of improved results at IB and IGCSE, as well as a number of outstanding achievements by individual students and their subject leaders.

For the third consecutive year, our graduating IB class gained an average point score of 33, comfortably exceeding the world average of 30. Our top individual score was 43, an outstanding achievement for Kyoung Wan Min (Tony) who had been at Regents since Year 8. He has been accepted into KAIST, South Korea's most prestigious university for the study of Science and Technology, to study Electronic and Electrical Engineering.

As a school, we offer a considerable number of options, and this year students were entered for 36 different subjects. In all but five of those, our students outperformed the world average, gaining a very creditable average point score of 5.2. There were, without exception, some really encouraging results in those subject areas working with a new syllabus this year. One area of particular improvement was undoubtedly the Core (Theory of Knowledge, Extended Essay, CAS), where over 80% of students gained at least two out of a possible three bonus points. This year's graduates have since scattered around the globe to study at some of the world's leading universities; from Hong Kong, Malaysia and Australia to the US, the UK, and the Netherlands, students are studying courses ranging from Economics to Graphic Design, Acting to Events Management, and Finance with Business Administration to Biomedical Science.

The Cambridge IGCSE results were also outstanding, with 90% of our students achieving A*- C grades grade outcomes, defying the trend of declining results in the UK. This year Regents also celebrates the achievements of three students who enjoyed

phenomenal success in individual subjects. Dong Hyun Kim was recognised for high achievement in First Language Korean; Leonie Hoffman achieved the top Drama result in Thailand; and Luke Daly was awarded for being the top in the world for Design and Technology (photograph opposite page, top).

Principal Iain Blaikie is delighted with these results: "Of course we applaud the very highest achievers, but so too do we applaud those students who achieved beyond their own expectations through sheer hard work and a determination to make the most of the wide variety of learning opportunities available to them here at Regents."

Meanwhile, after a year of preparation involving both staff and students, the Geography Department was awarded the prestigious Secondary Geography Quality Mark (SGQM) from the Geographical Association (GA) in the United Kingdom. Regents is one of only six international schools to attain the award this year, and the only school in Thailand to be globally recognised in this way. The SGQM, now into its 10th year, recognises student attainment, progress and achievement in areas such as geographical knowledge, understanding, values, skills and concepts, and sets expectations about the quality of teaching in geography. It also aims to promote effective subject leadership and management, helping subject leaders raise the standards of Geography in their schools. This ensures a continuing high standard of education in the subject area. Congratulations to Head of Department, Tim Spears, and his team.

OUR JUILLIARD COLLABORATION

It was with the greatest pleasure that we welcomed back to Regents, violinist Kathryn Andersen, for the start of the second year of her visits as part of our unique Juilliard-Nord Anglia Performing Arts Programme. Kathryn received her Master of Music degree from The Juilliard School and her Bachelor of Arts degree from Harvard University. Kathryn is now a member of the Curriculum Specialist Team at The Juilliard School.

We remembered well from her first visit, the energy and passion that Kathryn demonstrates when she works with students, and so for this visit we were eager to have her work with as many students as possible across the whole school, working on developing key transferable skills.

Indeed, according to *The Future of Jobs: Employment, Skills and Workforce Strategy for the Fourth Industrial Revolution*, a report released by the World Economic Forum earlier this year, the fast-paced technological advances will change the way we work, live and interact with each other forever. Some of the top skills needed in 2020 include complex problem solving, critical thinking, and creativity.* This is where the Juilliard collaboration can reward all of our students – not only those with an interest in performing arts. One of the many highlights of Kathryn's visit was a collaborative performance in the Globe Theatre – the first performance since our sound and light upgrade. Kathryn was joined by Mr Clement (piano) and Mr Kaz (double bass) and they performed the first movement of Dvorak's *Sonatina op.100*, much to the delight of the student and staff audience.

As part of her programme, Kathryn spent some quality time with our secondary and primary music staff, observing their teaching and demonstrating the use of the Juilliard Creative Classroom (online resources). She was also a guest performer at the Secondary School Speech Competition finals and taught lessons in both the Secondary and Primary schools.

It was not all work, however, and Kathryn took some time over a weekend to visit Koh Samet - a much-deserved break from a busy and wonderfully rewarding 4 day programme with us. We look forward to welcoming Kathryn back in May.


The combination of physical challenges, creativity and team work encouraged the students to explore their own potential as well as to push beyond their individual comfort zones.

Parent-led projects this half term have included the Green Grubs canteen which serves healthy snacks on Fridays to our Primary children, and cooking classes which celebrate the culinary highlights of our international community. We are delighted to share one of the recipes from those classes with our readers.





RECIPE Thailand's delicious Green Papaya Salad is is traditionally made using a clay mortar and wooden pestle and contains either dried shrimp (Som Tum Thai) or salted crab (Som Tum Pooh).

INGREDIENTS (serves 2): 1 ½ cups shredded green papaya, ½ cup shredded carrot, 5 halved cherry tomatoes, 1 tbsp dried shrimp or salted crab, 2 cloves garlic, 2 Thai chillies, 2 tbsp fish sauce, 5 green beans or 3 Chinese long beans, 1 lime and/or 2 tbsp tamarind juice, 1 ½ tbsp palm sugar, 2 tbsp roasted peanuts

METHOD: In a mortar, crush the garlic, then add green beans and cherry tomatoes. Pound a few times just to bruise the beans and squeeze the juice out of the tomatoes. Add chillies and crush them just enough to release the spice. Add the remaining ingredients. Mix well. Serve with sticky rice, cabbage leaves and green beans.

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
