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Spotlight on...

"John F Kennedy said: "Change is the law of life. And those who look only to the past or the present are certain to miss the future". However, Kennedy could never have forecast the exponential change of the past 20 years or so as technology has changed lives on a global scale. The demands that this has placed on educators can seem overwhelming at times – how can we prepare learners for future demands that keep shifting? One solution is for teachers to keep updating their skills and knowledge in order to keep 'current', and for schools to react swiftly to the latest research and thinking on best practice - and reflect this in their curricula.

Global orchestra

You may have already heard about our exciting global orchestra project.

"We are delighted to announce that we are bringing together our finest young musicians and singers in our first ever Global Orchestra performing in New York this summer! We are inviting vocalists and instrumentalists to showcase their talents and audition for our ensemble. Our Global Orchestra will join together in New York this June for an exclusive week long residential programme culminating in a public performance to celebrate their musical accomplishments. Students will participate in inspiring workshops guided by experts, watch performances by elite artists and be immersed in the city's arts culture to nurture their talent. Students will also develop their creativity, confidence and collaboration skills as they work with and learn from each other.

Auditions will take place in our 31 schools around the world in March. The top performers from each school will be invited to share a recorded audition with a global judging panel who will select three young musicians and singers from each school to join our 93 student international ensemble. This exciting opportunity is being funded by Nord Anglia Education as part of our commitment to helping students develop the skills and talents to achieve their ambitions.

In January we held our second annual Outstanding Teachers for Outstanding Schools (OTOS) recruitment event. The leadership teams from around our regions and schools came to London to recruit the very best teachers from a very strong field of candidates. In addition to their face-to-face interview each candidate attended a range of presentations to find out about our organisation, what it's like to teach in a Nord Anglia Education school and live in the particular region they chose, Global Classroom and Nord Anglia University:

- Over 600 face to face and online interviews were held for 282 vacant posts
- 156 offers have been made to date

The feedback from candidates was extremely positive. They were pleased to have been given the opportunity to meet the Principal or Head of School face to face and agreed that the content of the presentations inspired them to work in one of our schools. The best of those that weren't chosen have been placed into talent pools to ensure that roles will be found for them in alternative schools.

This month's highlighted community is the Mandarin Teaching community managed by Christian Bishop.

"Whilst we are all looking at maximising the 'power of 31', we in the China region have been looking at how we can make the most of the power of 6! We have pooled together the Mandarin teachers from all 6 China region schools to share a common curriculum and build a resource bank to support it. This means that we all have a high quality curriculum and resources that stem from a huge group of talented professionals, rather than individual schools. So far activity on the area has been frantic with many teachers uploading resources to share with their peers. This is fantastic to see and can only help Mandarin provision across our schools go from strength to strength!"

It ended up being an amicable discussion, and although I think our leaders would have liked us to rip apart each other's ideas a little, I think it was nevertheless a brave step for us all to make!"

Teaching Fellows

"It's hard to believe I'm already reflecting on my first six months in post as Teaching Fellow for World Languages! For this issue of Connect-Ed I've chosen to write about the goals I identified when I first started in post, and share a little bit about how we'll continue to work towards those goals in the coming months.

Having been a language teacher for 11 years now, I'm very familiar with the compelling need amongst linguists to talk, share, discuss and debate at every opportunity! Linguists are, unsurprisingly, a very communicative bunch by nature, and when I first took on the role of Teaching Fellow I set myself the goal to unite the World Languages community in NAE and get us all talking together. Whether on the forums, in the webinars, by email or even in person, I've seen some great interaction already this year and I plan to continue building on those foundations by encouraging linguists to join in with the community whenever they can.

Leading webinars was something completely new to me, and I would dare to say that we in China face some 'unique' technological challenges at times – but overcoming all of that to be able to talk and share live with international languages colleagues has given me a real buzz of achievement. Our webinars have been attended by a total of 37 World Languages, EAL and other interested teachers across the group, with 14 of them returning for two or more webinars.

We've covered areas such as internationalism, the IB diploma, and primary languages, with more topics coming up in the next few months to include some IGCSE exam discussion and a chat about how to improve uptake from Year 9 onwards. These online sessions in our community are always very lively, with participants either speaking on their microphones or furiously typing ideas into the chat box!

The next few months will see me concluding the first Study Course, continuing the monthly webinar series and building up the World Languages Resource Bank alongside the forum discussions. Excitingly, the seeds of a few inter-school collaborations have been sown in the forums, so I'm really looking forward to seeing what our World Languages teams manage to achieve together for their students between now and the summer.

Curriculum Corner - The "Master" (or mistress!) of your domain...

How many of you out there are currently studying for a Masters?

Last summer, 25% of teachers at Nord Anglia Education had a masters qualification. That's a lot of teachers with the experience of research on which to base their teaching – to help them improve and to ensure they are aware of the leading edge in educational thinking. But for those that don't have a masters (yet?) there is the opportunity of Nord Anglia University. Nord Anglia University recently launched a case study area for teachers to share the work they are doing with colleagues across the family. This gave the opportunity for Therese Andrews, from the British International School of Boston, who is currently studying for her masters at Harvard, to share her first term essay on whether the behaviours being developed in Boston were having any positive effect on students' academic progress and engagement.

This is only one of many case studies that are starting to appear on Nord Anglia University – which supplement an already rich research library with personal reflections from real teachers in our schools. The most recent of these, launched last month, was from Michelle Gill, Emma Wakelin and Adam Webb from year 3 in Puxi. The focus of this case study was "developing HPL in the year 3 classroom" – a great read!

It would be great to see other case studies appear on these pages. Are you a teacher with a masters who would be interested in sharing your dissertation or other relevant assignments? Or maybe you are currently a masters student? If so, why not tell us what you are doing and share your most recent work.

Of course, sharing case studies is not the only benefit of accessing Nord Anglia University. We are currently working with our university partner, King's College London, to accredit our leadership programmes....so if you are on the Middle, Senior or Executive Programme you may soon find that the course is worth more than a certificate of completion and actually counts credit towards a masters qualification.

We are also exploring the possibility of developing a a bespoke masters programme in International Education with King's College London. This is only at the very early stages, but we would be interested to hear from you if this is something that you would want to do, at a distance (supported by us of course!)Or what if you are thinking of doing a masters programme next year somewhere else? Or were coming to the end of the first year of your part time masters programme this year?

Of course, the evidence of the impact of a masters degree on eventual student outcomes is yet to be confirmed. Some evidence is very positive, whilst other evidence is far less so. However, as Dan Goldhaber writes in *The Mystery of Good Teaching*, "the lack of clear evidence on the effectiveness of teacher certification suggests we should continue experiments." Perhaps this is an opportunity for Nord Anglia Education teachers to demonstrate the impact of these degrees and answer this question once and for all?
