

Anti-Bullying Day!

What can we do as a school to take a stand on bullying? This was the question on our minds when we all came to school wearing pink on Wednesday 26th February.

The idea to hold this special day was put forward by Friends of Compass parent Cindy Spencer. In Mrs Spencer's home country of Canada a 9th Grade boy was bullied for wearing a pink t-shirt to school. In response to this, bystanders went out and bought pink shirts for themselves and others. The movement spread and each year the day is held across schools throughout Canada to create awareness on bullying. Everyone wears pink and we decided to bring it to Compass. We kicked the day off with an assembly that focused on what bullying is and how it makes a person feel. All children were given a white crisp piece of A5 paper. They were instructed to crumple it, stomp on it, everything except rip it. After, they were asked to smooth it out and try and get it back to its original state. They were told to reflect on what they had done to the paper and apologise. The children realised how even though they had apologised and did everything they could to return the paper to its original state, that there are still many scars that their behaviour had left on the paper and those scars will never really go away completely. For the children, the message was clear that this is the same principle that happens to people when they are

bullied. Even if there is a heartfelt apology the scars never completely go away. The children from Y4GA then performed a song called 'As One'. Everyone was invited to join in.

The day was filled with activities centred around the message of "No more bullying!" Children made video role plays, music videos and some fantastic posters which have gone on display all around the school and classrooms. As a school we were pleased how everyone pulled together for this wonderful cause. The school was awash with pink as students, teachers and even the security guards came wearing their brightest pink clothes. Today really had an impact on us all and we will be working together to become better friends to each other.








Ready, Steady, Gro...
