ENGLISH

This week the children will continue their work on letter writing.

The main learning objectives covered will be:

- Writing narratives about our own experiences and others'.
- To write for a purpose.
- Letter writing with the final task being a letter to Father Christmas.
- Re-reading and editing to check the work makes sense.
- Verbs used and if they are in the correct tense.



MATHEMATICS

Throughout the week, we will assess a number of the Year 2 key objectives:

- To solve Christmas word problems using both addition and subtraction.
- Interpret data from a pictograms, tally charts, block diagrams and simple tables.

Recall multiplication facts for the 2x, 5x and 10x table.
