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Why Read?

- Expands vocabulary
- Safety!
- Broadens your horizons
- Helps you relax
- Increase in knowledge
- Early reading skills = future academic success
- Builds independence and self-confidence
- Opens up new ways to understand the world
- Enhances imagination and capability for play
- Increases your cognitive ability
- Grammar and sentence structure modelled
- Great for family bonding



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Home Reading

What the Experts Say

- Time put aside for shared reading creates positive connotations around it (Wells, 1987)
- Maintaining a bedtime reading routine and hearing schools books read aloud builds bridges between home and school literacy which better enables readers (Collins & Svensson, 2008)
- Parental confidence in the ability to help impacts upon success at school (Lynch, 2002)
- 'Children's reading experiences lie in the social and cultural traditions of each of their families'

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Home Reading

What should home reading look like?

- Make it fun
- Part of play
- Take turns
- Let your child see you read
- Range of material
- Encourage favourites
- A daily event
- Keep it short
- Promote discussion
- Be positive

- Guided Reading (Skills based)
- 1:1 Reading with teacher or assistant
- Activities linked to weekly text
- Quiet reading time
- Visits to the Learning Centre
