We are working to create a school where everyone shares the belief that there is no limit to what we can achieve if we work hard together and individually.





Archaolgists - Go Potty at Compass!

This month, Year 4 GA were visited by a group of archaeologists from University College London's Qatar campus here in Doha.

The children in Year 4 have been learning all about Temples, Tombs and Treasure for the unit on IPC so this was a good practical opportunity to learn about how objects from the past can teach us about ancient civilisations.

The children learned what an archaeologist does and how important their work is. Following this, the children became archaeologists for the morning and helped to put some broken artefacts together. We were given pieces of broken pottery that we had to rebuild. The task highlighted just how important the job of an archaeologist is and also how tricky it can be.

Once the children rebuilt the pots they used their iPads to record what they had done and drew a picture of their finished work.

Our class were invited to visit the UCL laboratories to see how the real archaeologists work.

The visit provided inspiration for the children and as a result of this, some have decided to be archaeologists in the future.

Well, here we are at the end of a very exciting and challenging Term 1. We welcomed a lot of new students to our campuses at Rayyan and Gharaffa this year and they have added their unique individual contribution to our school.

The year has ended with a vibrant and colourful set of National Day Celebrations which were led by the wonderful teachers in our Arabic department. Thank you all! I certainly feel proud and privileged to have been part of these celebrations again this year.

Living in Qatar has certainly been an exciting and interesting experience and as I come to the end of another year it started me thinking about just how fortunate we are here. I know everyone grumbles about the traffic and the continuous building but it really is very easy to get into the habit of just looking inwards and thinking about how our lives are impacted by such trivial matters.

At Rayyan and Gharaffa this term we have been spending a lot of time thinking about how we can be ambitious, how we can set goals and work towards them to achieve personal success. We have some wonderful videos and animations that I hope you have seen that have recorded our thoughts and dreams. Many of our children had decided that their ambitions lay in serving other people and their communities. Many of them want to be doctors or surgeons, policemen or teachers. They have a real sense of wanting to help make a better world and I find that quite admirable.

Seeing things from another person's perspective isn't always easy but I had the chance recently to join a group of individuals who are embarking on a truly ambitious project which they hope will in time change their whole country for the better and improve the lives of children and young people.

I travelled to Kilifi County just outside Mombasa in Kenya to see the work of the charity Many Hopes. Many Hopes or Mudzini Kweto in Swahili works to support homeless and abandoned street children.

Taking these children off the streets and giving them a safe and loving home is just the first step. The home was built to make sure the girls feel like what they are: members of a family, not orphans in an institution. Each floor of the main house has four bedrooms, a living room, kitchen, house-mother and family of mixedage children. This is their home and their family until they choose to leave and make their own lives.

Now Many Hopes is building its first school. Not an ordinary school for poor kids that you can probably see



in your mind's eye, brick walls, tin roof, loads of children in each class, no glass in the windows, but a truly inspiring high quality school that will have places for children from all communities, a school where the children can learn to see each other as human beings of great worth and potential. The aim of the school is to grow a generation of young Kenyans who believe in equality and justice for all and who will in the future be the leaders of their communities and indeed of their country.

Now, that is ambitious!
