Dear Parents,

As well as finding information relating to activities in school, I would ask that you note the following cause:

Relief Fund for Fiji following Cyclone Winston

On 20 February, Fiji was struck by the most severe tropical cyclone ever recorded in the Southern Hemisphere. Fiji is reeling from the Cyclone Winston which killed 43 people, flattened entire villages and caused immense damage to infrastructure throughout the country.

For the first time in the history of Fiji, the Fiji government has reached out to the international community through the United Nations.

The Fiji Embassy in Beijing has opened an officially approved Special Account under the control of the Fiji Embassy at the Bank of China to receive funds from donations. All funds collected in China will then be remitted to Fiji to the Prime Minister's Cyclone Relief Appeal Fund. Bank account details are as follows:


Belts range from white belt all the way up to black belt. It's just like real karate, only without the bruises!

The children really enjoyed watching the teachers perform in costume! In Dolphins we listened to an audio version of the story so we had to really use our good listening skills to hear the words and imagine what was happening. As a class we learnt a new song about the Big Bad Wolf, the children then worked in teams to perform it using lots of actions and mean facial expressions!

We had a go at hot seating too! The children, who sat in the hot seat, pretended to be characters from the story. They did a great job of answering questions about themselves as though they were the little pigs or wolf. The Dolphins are becoming fantastic at asking interesting questions and I was blown away with some of their questions and answers - take a look:

WHAT A FANTASTIC WEEK IN YEAR THREE! By Zoe Hubbard, Year 3 Puffins Class Teacher

Year 3 have had fun this week with practical activities designed to support their learning.


As part of their Active Plane topic, Parrots, Puffins and Toucans learnt about what causes an earthquake and they are able to explain this using geographical language (tectonic plates and seismic waves). They then became engineers to investigate structures that would withstand an earthquake and reduce the devastation caused. After designing their structures, they used simple materials – marshmallows, toothpicks and kebab sticks – to build them. Their structures were then put to the test as they were placed onto a tray of jelly which was shaken to simulate the tremors from an earthquake. They found out that earthquake-proof buildings typically have cross bracing that forms triangles in its design (like a bridge). Such buildings usually have a large 'footprint' or base. Short buildings are more earthquake proof than tall ones.





'What bones form our skeleton?' was the question Year 3 were asked in Science this week. The children started by drawing around themselves and then putting inside the outline what they already knew about the bones which formed their skeleton. Once they had shared their existing knowledge, they used the 'Essential Skeleton 4' app to investigate the bones which form their skeleton and researched their scientific names. Did you know that of the 206 bones in an adult body, over half of these bones are in the hands, which have 54 bones, and the feet, which have 52 bones?

To celebrate the end of our Book Week, children are invited to come to school dressed up as a book character.




