YEAR 5 VISIT THE SCIENCE MUSEUM

This week the Year 5 children went to the Science Museum as part of the introduction to this term's unit on space. The children were able to see a life size replica of a rocket and envisage how the astronauts live inside, where they sleep, what they eat and how they entertain themselves and keep fit whilst inside the small space for long periods of time. They also got an opportunity to see what it would be like to train to go to the moon and what it would be like to walk on the moon.

Some quotes from the children about their learning at the museum:

Venetia: I thought astronauts would sleep in a bed but they sleep in a sack attached to the wall!

Lena: The three-dimensional rolling circle was great because you were able to imagine yourself in space not having any control of what you were doing.

Jason: I learnt that a spaceship is not very comfortable.

Pei-Jen: I learnt that a space ship is really big. They had to split it into 3 parts to fit it in the museum.

Edgar: The toilets in a space ship are different to ours. The waste goes into a storage space. You cannot have a shower so you have to use a sponge to wash.

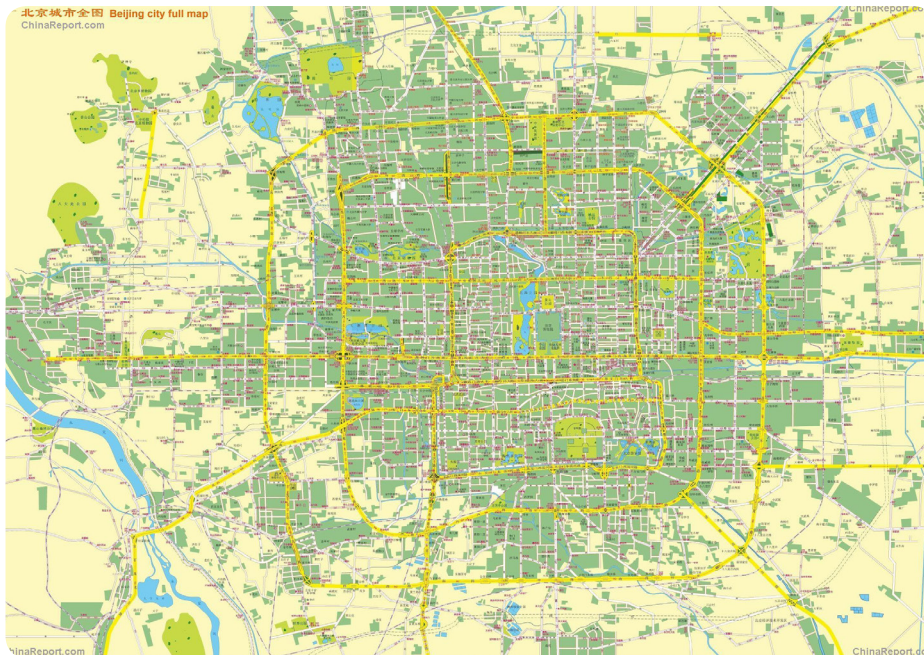


THE BIG WIDE WORLD

YEAR 3 EXPLORE THE CURRICULUM

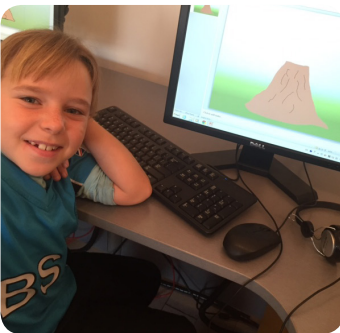

This week, the pupils in Year 3 have been developing their writing skills, using their creativity in Computing whilst also learning about States of Matter in Science.

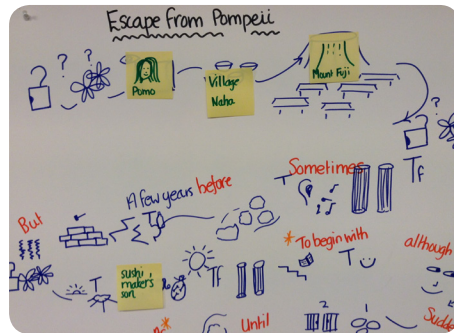
With our current topic, 'Active Planet', the Toucans, Parrots and Puffins have read and learnt the story, 'Escape from Pompeii', which tells the story of two young children living in the city of Pompeii when the catastrophic eruption of mount Vesuvius occurs. Following this, each class made up their own actions to aid them in retelling their story.

This week in class, the Year 3 children began to 'substitute' elements of the story, changing parts of the story with their own ideas. The Toucans class changed their main character from Tranio to twin sisters Victoria and Annie, Parrots set their story on the exquisite island of Hawaii and the Puffins had their new story set in Japan, nearby the towering Mount Fuji. Having worked collaboratively to adapt our original story, this week has seen the pupils challenge themselves in their writing, using detail and description in their writing to engage their reader.

Linking to our topic, the Computing lessons in Year 3 have seen the pupils use the programs Paint and Microsoft PowerPoint to begin creating their own volcanic eruptions simulations. Having drawn our images in Paint last week, we have been manipulating and changing them to show the process of a volcanic eruption whilst simultaneously learning new shortcuts.

In this week's Science lessons we concluded our investigations on whether evaporation occurs when water is boiled in a kettle. Did you know that it does take place?

Whilst also learning about how particles are formed in the different states of matter, the Year 3 pupils consolidated their understanding of the different scientific terms, playing a game of Go Fish, where they had to match different scientific terms with their definitions. For this week's investigative task, we planned and carried out an investigation to find out whether the mass of water was different when it changed from a solid to a liquid. Finally to support their reasoning skills (and for a bit of fun), the pupils were given an ice cube with the challenge of turning it into a liquid in the shortest amount of time. The pupils' methods ranged from sucking on the ice cube to holding the ice cube tightly in their hands. Nonetheless, all the pupils were able to melt their ice cubes and justify their chosen method. Be sure to ask the Year 3 pupils about their learning as it will soon include an experience of an explosive nature!

It has been great to have the support from parents at home, particularly at this important stage when they are beginning to read and write. We are well on our way to writing all by ourselves!
