



Looking beyond the US and UK

- High calibre options from world class institutions
- Many English-language offerings yet cultural immersion
- Possibility of studying in US or UK for one year
- New global opportunities



Canada

- US style flexibility at lower cost
- More international than US campuses
- Automatic IB scholarships
- Friendly work climate
- Safe cities
- Work visa upon graduation
- Subsidised tuition for citizens



Australia

- IB diploma highly valued
- Admission solely based on IB results
- Mini gap year before February start
- Subsidised tuition for Australian and NZ citizens
- Work visa upon graduation
- Pathways to Medicine



- Explosion of offerings in English
- Easy exchanges between universities
- Dutch Liberal Arts Colleges offer liberal arts model of education at low cost
- Strong programmes in fields of business, media, communication
- International student populations



Hong Kong / Korea / Japan

- More degree choices in English
- International Business / liberal studies offerings
- Joint ventures with western universities
- Excellent opportunities in STEM fields
- International students are favoured in admission



Japan	Term 1 Year 13	Nov – March	2-4 months
Korea	Term 1 Year 13	June – July	1-3 months
Singapore	Term 1 Year 13	Nov - Feb	On IB results

- Offers are a match to be made, not a prize to be won
- Look for intersections of strengths, interests and what the world needs
- Consider some global opportunities



- The more selective a college is, the better it must be
- If a university if "easy" to get into, it can't be any good
- The "best" students are applying to the UK and US, therefore, so should I
- I need to skip class/PE/ECAs in order to do my university applications
- If I make the wrong choice now, my future/career/life will be over
- Only students who attend the more famous universities have jobs/are financially secure/ lead fulfilling lives
- Universities only make offers to one student from a school

University visits

- Meet with the university representatives who may read your application
- Listen to "taster" academic sessions
- Learn from other's career paths
- Compare universities at fairs
- Travel to universities if at all possible







February/March	1 st individual meeting	Student/ counsellor
February - June	Information classes	Student
March – June August – April [Yr13]	Subsequent individual meetings	Student / counsellor
Term 3	Guidance conference	Student/counsellor/parents

- Can apply in Year 13 and defer or apply during gap year
- Service, travel, language immersion, internships
- Support from guidance team does not end when you graduate



Advice for parents

- Be supportive
 - Student's future plans
 - Personal goals and ambitions
- Be open and honest
 - About financial considerations
 - About what you as parents are willing to support
- Be understanding
 - The nature of future career is incredibly fluid
 - □ The IB Diploma is the equivalent of undertaking 7 first year degree programmes + an independent research paper + 150 hours of prescribed activity just to pass
- Be Realistic
 - If you don't get the university you hope for now then you can get it at graduate level
 - The most selective universities with the most competitive programmes are not short of applications

Next steps

- Think about what you enjoy, how you learn best, where you are headed
- Talk as a family and devise a worldwide strategy
- Do some thinking and research before your meeting with your university counsellor
- Follow your own path resist pressure to follow the crowd
