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On a trial basis, the APA is proposing that a person receive the diagnosis of Internet Gaming Disorder, if at least five of the following nine characteristics apply to that person:

- *Preoccupation*: Spends lots of time thinking about games, even when not playing them.
- Withdrawal: Feels restless when unable to play games.
- *Tolerance*: Needs to play more, or play more powerful games, to get the same excitement as before.
- *Reduce*: Feels he or she should play less, but is unable to.
- Give up other activities: Reduces participation in other recreational activities.
- *Continue despite problems*. Continues to play games despite knowing that they have a negative impact on his or her life.
- Deceive: Lies about how much he or she games.
- Escape mood: Plays games to reduce anxiety or stress.
- *Risk*: Risks loss of significant relationships or employment because of games.

Instead of taking their devices away, set ground rules. Create guidelines and consequences with your children, but you MUST stick to them and they are more effective if you abide by them too.



Tip 2



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Consider making screen time an earned activity. Once your child has finished their chores or a physical activity then they can earn some screen time.





Monitor what your child is doing online, who they are communicating with, what apps or games they are playing and how long they are spending online...



...but do it with them and make it a conversation, not a spying mission.



Have a space where all family members leave their devices over night and a certain time that they need to be there.





# Designate where devices are and are not to be used in the house (and it should never be in the bedroom).



Tip 6



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Work with your child to learn how to use devices as a tool to create instead of a way to fill time.

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### General Use and Safety around School





- Laptops will be stored in classrooms during the day, or in cubbies (not locked), and students can only use them with permission at certain times throughout the day.
- Laptops are not allowed out during break-times or lunch.
- Hard case or soft sleeve to transport device around school.
- Brought to school fully charged.





- Ensuring that devices are clearly labeled and identifiable to all who use the devices.
- Students will not be able to torrent or download illegally through the school servers.
- Most importantly Educating through the Digital Citizenship and Computing lessons.



A core feature of this program is developing our pupils' ability to take responsibility and manage their own device. A principal element of this responsibility is taking appropriate care of the device. This includes management of software, and hardware as well as issues requiring technical support should they occur. **Students should take responsibility for their laptop by:** 

- Installing virus protection and keep it up to date
- Keeping their laptop in a protective sleeve whilst moving around school - suitable sleeves are easily available for around 300,000vnd from computer stores.



#### Students should take responsibility for their laptop by:

• Securing their laptop in a student cubby whilst it is not in use. Cubbies in the MP3 corridors will be updated to accommodate this.





- Using their laptop away from open liquids such as drinks – this will be strictly enforced by teachers.
- Using their laptops in appropriate areas of the school.

**Implications - Pupil responsibility** 

#### Safety to and from school

- This is a concern for us as it is the only area of safety that we cannot monitor here on site.
- As mentioned, pupils will be expected to have the laptop enclosed in their sleeve, and then in their backpack at all times when leaving school ie. not visible.
- Backpacks should be worn at all times.
- They should not be using the laptop at any time between home and school and vice-versa.
- There will be sessions over the first weeks to enforce the importance of these points.





# Technical Support





#### DAY TO DAY SOFTWARE/ HARDWARE

As stated in the previous slide, one of the primary benefits of a student having ownership of their own device is the opportunity to develop their ability to manage it. As we, and other large international schools around the region, have experienced, most technical issues experienced by students can be addressed by themselves or their peers. Those of a little more difficult nature are usually easily fixed by our technicians.

#### WIRELESS CONNECTION SUPPORT

Our technical support team will support students to attain a secure and stable connection to our internet connection facilitating access to our primary learning tools.

#### HARDWARE ISSUES REQUIRING REPAIR

This will be left to parents to organise. All laptops will come with a 1 or 2 year warranty from both the supplier and the maker of the device. Ensure that you are getting the best possible deal when it comes to warranty. For example, some laptop makers provide a 2 year international warranty (Asus and Lenovo are 2 such examples).





### Common Questions





#### Could we get a Netbook, iPad or tablet instead?

Tablets and netbook style computers are great for receiving content but are not suitable for creating content. In effect, a chromebook probably would be suitable for 80-90% of all tasks we ask of a laptop here at the Junior Campus, however, there will be tasks which will need the extra computing power required to drive a program, or the space on a hard-drive to store it. In addition, chromebooks will not be suitable for Secondary so this would ensure that a new laptop would be needed next year if in Year 6, or the year after if coming into Year 5.

#### How are you going to secure the laptops when children are at break?

This was one of the largest areas of concern for us when discussing the introduction of a BYOD policy here at the Junior Campus. To keep laptops safe during periods of inactivity, they will be stored in the student cubbies in the corridor. The cubbies in MP3 will be adapted to include a large enough space to store any laptop, and a lip on the bottom of the cubby provided so that devices will not fall out. The use of CCTV cameras is also extensive in both corridors presently, but we will be adding even more cameras on those thoroughfares in which laptops will be stored. This will ensure that every cubby will be clearly visible and anyone who goes near, or enters another cubby will be clearly recorded.





#### Why introduce this?

As a school, the introduction of BYOD further down the age groups was always going to be the next step. The Secondary School took the lead with this initiative 6 years ago, thereby giving us in the Primary a chance to see first hand the teething issues that were encountered by the senior students. We have met several times with both our Secondary colleagues and the IT Support team to ensure that these concerns have been alleviated.

#### What are the benefits?

The biggest positive is of course the access for all our pupils to first rate technology, safe in the knowledge that the device they will be working on will be robust enough to complete each task quickly and efficiently. Added to that of course is the fact that the device students will be working on at school will be the same device that students will be able to work on at home. This enables us to bridge the gap between the learning experience of our pupils at school and at home. By enabling the choice of laptop to be individualised we are able to overcome barriers as pupils take ownership of their learning tools.
