


How to motivate children

Intrinsic Motivation



Extrinsic Motivation money grades



Intrinsic Motivation Engage in a behavior because it is personally rewarding, not for an external reward



How to motivate children

Rewards and Intrinsic Motivation





Type of Reward	Effect on Intrinsic Motivation
Engagement-contingent, tangible rewards	Decreased Intrinsic Motivation
Completion-contingent, tangible rewards	Decreased Intrinsic Motivation
Competitive Rewards	Decreased Intrinsic Motivation
Unexpected rewards	No Change
Rewards for otherwise boring tasks	Usually No Change
Rewards not contingent on task performance	No Change
Positive feedback and praise	Increased Intrinsic Motivation



Focus on your child's interests



- Interesting and varied topics
- Let children take control
- Reading and writing practise with any topic
- Maths can be done anywhere










Help with homework: Instruction Vs Education



- Instruction: Telling your child what to do and how to do it.
- Education: Allowing them to become more independent.
- Don't rush in with the answer
- Discuss how they can find out more





Allow mistakes and recognise their strengths

- Making mistakes is ok
- Avoid correcting every single mistake
- Focus on their strengths
- Ask them to tell you what they have learnt

Youdon t learn much by doing everything right.





Words to motivate your child

Consider saying

- Look how far you've come! I'm very proud of you!"
- "I can tell you really care about learning English/Science/IPC."
- "You have such clear handwriting!"
- "That is a creative idea!"
- "You are really fully focused on your work."

Avoid saying

- "Don't say it in our language, say it in English."
- X "I am happy when you get good grades at school."
- You need to study more!"
- "If you finish your homework, I will buy you a new game."












Enriching vocabulary through learning opportunities



Increased vocabulary is linked to greater academic performance.

More known words = more <u>access</u> to information.

Vocabulary influences thinking of the world.

Adults play an <u>essential role</u> in developing children's word banks.

Children's vocabularies are influenced by the following factors:

- **→**Exposure to lots of words
- → Exposure to a range of words
- → Conversations with adults who use 'narratives' or

explanations



How to help build your child's vocabulary?

- Children need to hear a word many (4-12) times before they can use it
- → <u>repeat and emphasize</u> new words on different occasions and situations
- Help your child understand what a word means → provide context and examples





- Gestures, actions or visuals are incredibly effective to explain new words
- Appropriate feedback when your child is using a new word
- Read daily!














Let's play!

The Importance of Conversation at Home



'Children will listen to you only after they feel listened to' - Jane Nelson

(US businesswoman, politician and former teacher)

Conversation is important

Harvard and MIT research shows that <u>two-way conversation</u> **grows** a <u>child's brain</u>







The benefits of two-way conversation

Children need to <u>participate in conversation</u>, not just listen. Conversation can benefit:

- Brain growth
- Language development
- Exam scores
- Speaking
- Writing
- Vocabulary
- Self-confidence

- Think before speaking
- Speak in <u>full sentences</u>





Developing strong speakers

- Use <u>ambitious vocabulary</u>





Why you should read with your child, and how to do it



Did you know?

A child who reads 20 minutes every day sees nearly 2 million words each school year.

(Nagy & Hayman, 1987)

5 min/day STUDENT C reads at home











What happens when you stop reading to your child?

Benefits:

Personal – Childs' first language is critical to identity and positive self-concept

Social – maintains important links to community

Intellectual – Develops intellectual maturity

Educational - higher academic achievement

Use your first language


- 6-8 hours a day in an English environment


