




Admissions



The US Model of Education

- 4 year programme [Sept May]
- Breadth, then depth
- Emphasises exploration and discovery
- Focusses on reasoning, communication, critical thinking, problem solving skills
- Flexible and interdisciplinary
- NO Law or Medicine at undergraduate level



Public V Private

Public and private refer to the way a school is funded:

Public Schools

Obtain a part of their support from the state in which they are located Tuition is often lower than that of private schools Generally charge lower tuition to state residents

Private Schools

Supported by student tuition, investment income, research contracts and private donations.


Types of institutions

- Liberal Arts colleges
- Universities
- Professional schools e.g.
 Architecture, Business etc.



US Degree Structure

Highly Flexible, Many options



- Core vs Open Curriculum
- Double Major
- Self-designed major
- Study abroad
- Co-op programmes

Annual costs

Total cost: tuition + living costs [room, board, books, supplies, personal]

Private: US\$45,000 – 65,000+

Public [residents]: \$26,000+

Public [non-residents]: \$40,000



In HSBC's 2017 report, The Value of Education, the US again emerged as the top choice for parents considering university abroad for their child – but also one of the most expensive, with parents contributing an average of US\$58,464 towards their child's education in the US per year (including tuition fees, transport, books and accommodation).

Financial Need/Aid

Financial need = total cost – expected family contribution

- Merit scholarship vs need-based aid
- Need blind vs need aware

Need blind schools don't consider an applicant's financial need when making admissions decisions but many are not able to meet need]

- FAFSA / CSS profile
- Financial aid for international students
- Who offers merit based aid in USA?

- Global orientation
- Opportunities
- Academia vs pre-professional
- Celebration of diversity
- Competitive vs laid back
- Sporting culture / school spirit

Strategies

- Research well, visit, network!

- Don't follow the crowd or rely on ranking
- Plan on graduate school
- Use resources formal and informal

- Reading, writing, speaking, listening
- Required for IB English B students
- Take in Year 12 term 3 or Year 13 term 1
- If applying to US and UK, take IELTS



Application elements


From the student

- Online application
- Activities
- Official scores from College Board or ACT
- Essays [multiple]
- Portfolio / audition if applicable
- Awareness of key deadlines


From the school

- Transcripts Year 10-13
- Predicted grades
- 1-2 teacher letters of recommendation
- Counsellor recommendation
- School profile
- Sending of documents

The Common Application



University online portals



Early Decision

- Apply by November 1st or 15th (Some earlier)
- Get a decision by December 15th
- BINDING: accept immediately if admitted
- Cancel all other applications worldwide
- Can improve chances at some colleges- but not all



Early Action, Priority, Rolling, Restrictive Early Action

- Apply by October 15th or November 1st
- Get a decision in December / January
- NOT BINDING: wait for other outcomes
- Improve chances at State Universities
- REA: Harvard, Yale, Princeton, Stanford



Regular Decision


- Apply by January 1st or 15th
- Get a decision by April 1st
- Pay deposit to one university by May 1st
- Waitlist move May-June
- IB results early July



Deadlines

	Earl Decision, Early Action, Priority, Rolling, Special	Regular Decision
Submit essay drafts to your counsellor	August 2018	September 2018
Complete standardised testing	October 2018	November 2018
Submit application online	October/November 2018	December 2018

Admissions Criteria



X Factors

- Demonstrated interest
- Legacy
- Exceptional sports / talent
- Under-represented groups or priority populations
- Undersubscribed major

What else!

Top tips for US applications

- Start early- each application takes time and concentration
- Prove your passion for the subject- US universities love passionate students
- Seek information directly from the institutions
- Write a stellar personal statement
- Use your own voice
- Honesty is the best policy



Next steps

- Research the difference between various US universities
- Attend / network at university visits
- Complete standardised testing in Year 12 if possible
- Draft essays over the summer
- Do campus tours if possible
- Add colleges to Bridge U
- Meet your counsellor following Tet holiday
- Choose two teachers to write subject references for you

- April 6, 2018: registration deadline for May SAT
- April 14 2018 ACT
- May 5, 2018: SAT
- June 2, 2018: SAT Subject tests
- June 9 2018 ACT
- July 14 2018 ACT

What parents can do?

- Let your child have the driver seat universities want students to advocate for themselves
- Discuss financial and geographic constraints early on
- Keep things in perspective; take the long term view
- Keep things confidential
- Visit campuses in person
