The IBDP is an accessible and rewarding programme that provides excellent preparation for university education and employment. IBDP students are valued for their high academic standards. In addition, the IB Learner Profile helps students to be critical thinkers who are open-minded, resilient, reflective and have a greater understanding of the wider world.

These developments will include: a new science lab, an extension to the existing library provision, additional classroom space and investment in a wide range of new resources and ICT facilities.

We are now looking forward to our verification visit in January 2017. DCIS will be visited by two members of the IB world community to confirm that we meet the required standards to offer the programme. After a promising consultancy visit in November, we are positive about the verification visit and look forward to hearing their feedback on the development of the programme at DCIS.

On Wednesday 1st February at 8.45am and 6.00pm in Cooper Hall there will be Information Sessions about the launch of the IBDP programme at DCIS. The information sessions will be open to interested parents. Even if your child is in a younger year group, we would encourage you to attend the evening so that you can learn about the long-term vision of the DCIS Sixth Form and we can explain the different pathways available at DCIS from August 2017.

Dear DCIS Parents and Guardians,

Thank you to all the parents that attended our Year 3 and above Carols by Candlelights Christmas concert on Thursday or Friday night last week. For me this summed up what is the very best about DCIS. We had children from throughout the school community performing at the very highest levels aided and supported by a large number of students and teachers. The community feeling of the event was further manifested by a parent running the sound for us. Both evenings were delightful and the feedback from parents and guests was phenomenal. It was a very similar story with delightful concerts from our Lower Primary School classes this week.

We have had a very successful term on the sporting field. Mr Holmes gives an update to staff during our meeting each Friday and the list of success takes up most of the time! What really impresses me when I watch our teams is how they conduct themselves whether winning or losing. Further away from school 12 students had a very successful trip to Tanzania and made a huge impact on the school they supported as well as enjoying a safari. Our suite of year trips started this week with Year 5 off to Indonesia.

From an academic perspective the term started in an excellent way with recognition of 3 students who scored the highest in their subject in EDEXCEL IGCSE examinations. Both Primary, Secondary and the DSE have made enhancements to the way they teach and assess and the feedback from students and parents was been excellent.

Several SLT members including myself were in Hanoi earlier this month at the Nord Anglia Education regional conference which was an excellent opportunity to share expertise amongst the eight schools we have in the region. I am pleased that DCIS gave two presentations, one around how we have created a curriculum and assessment model to challenge all students to achieve the very highest and one about how we structure our support needs to ensure we are ambitious for every one of our students. To be able to present on initiatives that show excellence in the complete range of what we do is extremely powerful.

It has been a very successful term and I am grateful to the DCIS community for making me feel so welcome so quickly. I have said this before so apologies for repeating myself but we have wonderful children, a fantastic staff team and supportive parents; a winning formula for any school. We have continued to make structural improvements to the school. Unfortunately we had a couple of technical setbacks to our half term projects but these will be finalised



over the Christmas holiday so we will have a functioning covered basketball court and swimming pool in January. We have two other projects to be completed shortly. One is the Sensory Room which will provide an excellent resource for students needing sensory intervention. Another is a new library IT system that we have been working on for the last two months. Shortly into next term the pieces of card will be no more as we use bar codes to manage our library system and borrowing from it.

I have also enjoyed my first few months back in Singapore. I have enjoyed meeting various members of the Singapore education community – it turns out it is a small world after all as the Principals of Dulwich College, Tanglin School and Dover Court International School all went to the same University; two of us more or less at the same time!

Unfortunately parents are not allowed for the first round of auditions but are welcome to attend the final performance.

Timeline:

The first round of auditions will be held next term on Friday January 13th within class.

Each class will vote for their two representatives and these students will go forward to Round 2. In Round 2, students will be invited to record their performance in our TV studio. The recordings will be completed by the end of January.



These videos will then be shared and available for viewing and voting. The final winners will be announced on Friday 10th February and they will get to perform at a celebration assembly on March 3rd. Their recording will be shared and displayed on our TV screens around the school.

Wrap Up: Tanzania Global Expedition



Eight day Global Expedition to Tanzania included community service and a two day safari

The Global Expedition programme offers exciting opportunities that challenges students to take a new perspective on issues affecting communities the world over. This November, 11 DCIS students and other NAE classmates took part in an eight day community service expedition to Tanzania. The end goal: to build connections, develop a strong sense of sustainability and become true global citizens.

While these Year 9, 10 and 11 students were in Tanzania, we took part in a variety of sustainable service projects. We discussed in detail with the local community and the leaders of the expedition what sustainability meant to them. The aim was to be able to work independently without negative impacts on the community in the future. The

projects we participated in were building goat sheds, constructing smokeless stoves and installing solar panels for five different families. At Nazarati School we helped with laying the foundation for a new classroom and plastering the walls of a new teacher accommodation block.

After a few days of hard work, we drove off in a huge safari truck and a small 4 x 4 for a night in the bush. During the two day safari at Tarangire National Park, we were overwhelmed by the number of animals we saw including lions, wildebeests, giraffes, impalas, elephants and many more. One group even saw the stealthy and elusive leopard which is rarely spotted.

The safari was not all fun and games however. We recorded every animal spotted and noted down data including the total number, gender, age and location. We used this data to learn more about the animals and their migration patterns and how this information could potentially be used for protection of the animals against wildlife poachers. Since our base was a fenceless campsite in the middle of the park, during the night we had monkeys and wild dogs pay a visit and one group even had lions roaming nearby! All in all it was an impactful and exciting trip and we all had an amazing experience.
