Our Global Campus is the online students from NAE schools around the world. Our students are part of a global community, and through Global Campus interact with their peers, and cooperate aspects of our curriculum, including our world-leading collaborations. Students can participate by posting their entries or thoughts to the platform, using or taking part in the live events such as discussions led by experts from a number of fields, including STEAM, Performing Arts, and Social Impact. The platform is coordinated by members of our central team who develop resources, collaborations, and monitor activity to keep our students safe online.

The Global Campus supports our aim to develop our students' collaborative skills, creativity, courage, critical thinking, cultural awareness and communication. It is unique to NAE and allows our students to make connections and gain understanding about our other schools, as well as giving them the opportunity to join webinars and watch-talks by world-leading experts. This year so far we have already had sessions by an astrophysicist, a robotics expert, and a neuroscientist, as well as Juilliard alumni, and a workshop led by the World's Largest Lesson. These really are amazing experiences!

Every year we join a number of competitions that are linked to our Global Campus collaborations, and our students enjoy the participation. The Creative Writing Competition, Comic Book Competition, and Visual Arts Competition are this year all linked to the Global Goals related to Climate Action, Life on Land, and Life under Water. World Children's Day encourages our students to use their voice to share their ideas around climate change, something that our students are very passionate about. Through our other collaborations students are able to explore the world around them, problem solve, try new skills, and express themselves in creative ways. This happens through virtual sports and musical events, as well as dance challenges, science experiments, and mindfulness activities, all tailored for our students. Many of these activities have been created by the talented teachers from across our schools, as well as through our partnerships with MIT, Juilliard, and UNICEF.

Virtual Learning

When we had to switch to online learning, we were really fortunate in that we were already operating in a technology-rich environment. Whilst all schools faced challenges, we were well-placed in terms of infrastructure and remote learning, as we had a blend of synchronous and asynchronous learning facilitated by technology and a student-led learning environment.

A key decision that supported our community was following regular academic timetables of classes and daily routines. Every student was able to receive high-quality teaching and learning balanced with pastoral support to maintain both their progress and wellbeing. Every day, primary students were able to attend online classes and meetings, retaining communication. Students, parents, and teachers could always support and encourage each other. Both academic progress and wellbeing are always monitored and appropriately supported. Pupils younger than four years old received an individual learning/activity material kit "SPLAT Box" (SPLAT stands for "Stay Play Learn All Together") to aid with their online learning. Throughout these trying times we were incredibly proud of our staff, students and parents for their efforts and commitment.





Success Stories

Alice Lee

One of the most exciting highlights from our 2020 academic results was Alice Lee's perfect IBDP diploma score of 45, earning her the 2020 Dux Scholaris Award, which is awarded each year to the top academic performer at the IBDP level in BIS. Alice joined BIS in Y12 and showed enormous potential from day one, but that's not to say there weren't obstacles to overcome. When first joining the BIS family she had to overcome the challenges faced with a language barrier, but through the help of her friends, guidance and support of our teachers & staff, and of course, through her own self will and determination she was able to push through and excel in both her academic studies and Co-Curricular activities.

We wish Alice all the success in her future as she studies Business Administration at the National University of Singapore.

Chan Hyeok

Of course success is not just measured in the classroom, as was the case for our Year 6 student Chan Hyeok Kim, who was this year's winner of the Young Musician of the Year. Almost 100 students between BISHCMC and BVIS entered the contest, and had to go through two rounds of auditions before making it to the grand finale. The talent on display throughout the contest was magnificent and full of variety, but it was Chan Hyeok's rendition of 'Czardas' by Monti on the Violin that took home the final prize. Congratulations once again, we are already looking forward to next year's competition!

Exam Results

Despite the circumstances our class of 2020 IB Students overcame adversity to achieve our best results ever! 42% of students achieved an incredible score of 40 or more, over three times the global average, and the year finished with an average point score of 38, compared to the world average of 29.92.

Elsewhere in secondary our IGCSE results far exceeded the UK national and independent school results for another year running. 74% of all IGCSE grades obtained by BIS HCMC students were for the top grades of A* or A, over three times higher than the English national average for the 2019-20 academic year, and 99% of students' grades were A*-C.

Secondary students weren't the only

ones to yield fantastic results, as our Primary results for the GL Assessments for English and Maths were well above the average score of 100 for UK Primary State and Independent schools. KS1 achieved 104.5 in Maths and 106.4 in English, whilst KS2 earned 109.2 in Maths and 111.5 in English.

After creating connections through building the tiles together, our students then made further connections and demonstrated their international knowledge in our International Day House Quiz set by our resident Quizmaster, Mr Gamwell.

Massachusetts Institute of Technology

For this year's challenge, we're joining three MIT experts conducting out of this world research. These experts are working on advancing and enabling human exploration of space, including human travel to Mars (and, equally important, the journey home to Earth).



The first MIT Challenge for this year is looking into the work of Dr. Ariel Ekblaw at MIT's Space Exploration Initiative. They are experimenting with how common activities and items can be modified to work in a zero gravity environment like the International Space Station or a spaceship that is travelling to another planet. Dr. Ekblaw has tasked our students with designing a zero gravity method for food delivery, exercise or creating art. Our students have ideated designs and sent questions to Ariel's team and we are looking forward to what solutions they devise for this challenge.

STEAM

STEAM is an interdisciplinary approach to education that promotes problem solving and the development of 21st century skills. This inclusive method helps equip our students with the skills they need to join the workforce of tomorrow. We have access to current MIT research projects and professors who are able to share their understandings and provide us with opportunities to learn alongside them as they make their discoveries.

Fundinotots-BIS Baby and Toddler Group



After a period of extended closure as a result of covid-19 we were really excited to welcome back our Fundinotot families back to school at the start of September. It was great to see the children and their parents exploring and enjoying the activities set up in the Fundinotots room as well as making new friends.

Fundinotots BIS baby and toddler group offers the opportunity for young children up to the age of three years to have fun and mix with other children in a safe and friendly environment where parents can meet other parents and share and extend their early learning experiences. By working in true partnership with parents Fundinotots aims to provide a stimulating, challenging environment which is a warm, friendly extension of home. Fundinotot is a place where children and adults can explore, have fun, play, talk and learn together, developing as happy, confident and independent individuals.

Fundinotots provide an informal play environment that enables children to have opportunities to interact with other children and flourish within our creative school setting. Activities are designed to support a young child's developing skills such as communication and motor skills, for example, through messy and water activities, mark-making, board books and action songs. Sand, messy and water play, painting, story time, role play and music and movement time are just a selection of some of the activities that are offered during every Fundinotot sessions.

Fundinotots is open to all children aged from birth to three years to attend with a parent or grandparent and Fundinotot sessions are held daily in our purpose build Fundinotots room at the following times:

Physical Development and the EYFS

Next year in England all schools will follow the new revised Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS) Development Matters. In September 2020 some schools could become "Early Adopters" and start using the document. Here at BIS HCMC we decided to become an "Early Adopter" and this has informed our interim term reports that will be shared later this term. The revised guidance is formatted differently. Whereas children's development was broken down into quite small bands in the previous document, it is now broken down into three larger bands:

birth to three threes and fours fours and fives (Reception year).


Physical development is still one of the three prime areas within the EYFS framework. Each prime area is divided into Early Learning Goals, and now for physical development these are called: Fine Motor Skills and Gross Motor Skills. But what are they and why are they important?

Fine motor skills are when a child uses precise movements using specific body parts, such as the thumb and finger to pick objects up. They will use pincer movement, when a child uses an index finger and thumb, to pick up and move objects.

Gross motor skills are when a child uses their whole body in a movement, such as jumping or running. They develop hand-eye coordination when a child's hands and eyes are working together, for example catching a ball.

Both these skills help when a child starts to mark make. This could be anything, from a baby or child making marks with their fingers in sand, to dipping their hands or fingers in paint, to paint a picture. These changes are not new concepts and in previous F1 Development Day these phrases have been share with Parents with examples of Physical Development in the classroom. Parents have been able to see Gross Motor Skills in action at F2 and F3 sport days. At BIS HCMC we are lucky to have outdoor facilities to support develop Fine and Gross Motor Skills including our climbing wall on the roof that is mainly used by F3.

However, we are mindful to recognise that learning and development in the area of physical development is an active process which occurs at different rates and stages for different children. You can also help at weekends and holidays by following:
