Why it Matters: Cultural Capital

### Cultural Capital refers to how power in society is transferred.

**Objective:** cultural goods, books, works of art **Embodied:** language, mannerisms, preferences **Institutionalised:** qualifications, education credentials

Disciplinary Literacy: Not just for English!



Every teacher communicates their subject through academic language, and that reading, writing, speaking and listening are at the heart of knowing and doing Science, Art, History, and every other subject in secondary school.

What are we doing at KS3? Reading

- NEW Reading Lessons: We focus on reading strategies, such as activating prior knowledge, prediction and questioning. These can improve students' comprehension.
- NEW Yearly Regents Reading Challenges
- NEW Tutor Group Reading Time
- NEW Reading Challenge CCA with mentors
- Emphasis on vocabulary

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## What are we doing at KS3? Academic Writing







We know that writing is challenging! Students in every subject benefit from explicit instruction in how to improve.

- We break writing down into planning, monitoring and evaluation, and support students by modelling each step.
- We provide targeted support to students who struggle to write fluently, as this may affect writing quality.
- Teachers use a variety of approaches, including collaborative and paired writing, to motivate students to write.
- Weekly Writing Challenges build confidence and fluency.

What are we doing at KS4?






We know that students can sometimes find it difficult to balance their workload in their examination years. However, it is vital for their academic success that they continue to develop their reading and writing skills.

• NEW: Register and Read (reciprocal reading) for all Year 10 and 11 students

What can you do?



- Read with your child, or encourage them to read, daily
  - Books (fiction and non-fiction)
  - Articles
  - Magazines
- Ask your child questions about their reading what kind of text is it? Do they like it? What interesting ideas have they discovered through it?
- Talk about world events
- Listen to podcasts and radio talk shows
