In looking through the list of winners, I noted that the majority are students who have been with us for many years. This confirms what we have often noticed i.e. that students who stay longer at BSG often achieve significantly better results.

Money Talk

In Y2 Maths, it has been all about 'Money' focusing mainly on British Pounds and Pence. We used real money from Ms Mary's piggy bank to explore the values, shapes, colour and sizes of coins and notes. One of the cool tricks we learnt was to use patterns to help us remember all the different denominations. We discovered that the digits 1, 2 and 5 are repeated. Have a look and see. 1p, 2p, 5p; 10p, 20p, 50p; £1, £2, £5 and £10, £20, £50!

To help prepare us for concepts such as 'buying', 'selling' and 'giving change', we took a trip to our local corner shop. Each group had to think about how much money they wanted to spend before deciding on what they wanted to buy. Some groups spent all their money whilst others got some change back. Now that we have a good understanding of what it means to give change, we are ready for lots of fun hands-on activities as we buy and sell items in our classroom shop over the coming weeks!





Maths Challenge

Year 6 have been taking part in a Maths challenge alongside several of our Nord Anglia schools in China. Shanghai, Beijing and Nanjing have joined us in celebrating the year of the tiger in a numerical way! Children have had the opportunity to push their skills in spatial awareness, number sense and collaboration. It has been great to see children rise to the challenge and amazing to see children displaying talents in geometric puzzles.

Our activities included a tangram challenge. For those not familiar, the tangram is a dissection puzzle consisting of seven flat polygons, called tans, which are put together to form shapes. The objective is to replicate a pattern, and in this case we used different animals from the Chinese Zodiac using their silhouettes. This was an activity that seemed quite simple at first, but proved to be quite complex. The children showed excellent perseverance trying different ideas and arrangements until they were successful.

The children also attempted a series of challenges based on the zodiac where they needed to spot number patterns within different sets of objects. Year 6 have shown great enthusiasm for problem solving and we have been very happy to take part in these themed activities to celebrate the new year. Hopefully they will share some of these puzzles with you at home and you can join in the fun



Top Learning Village Certificate

We are very pleased to be awarded 2nd best in the world in 2021 from Learning Village. Learning Village is an online platform used by our students who are still learning English.

Students have the option of improving their social English and grammar, their curriculum. English or their phonics and spellings and we guide them on which is the best programme for them. We do not spend a lot of time on this while we are at school. It is something extra that the children do at home to further enhance their English language learning. This is why it is so impressive that they have managed to win in the 'total points scored' category putting The British School of Guangzhou 2nd place in the world!

Year 3's core text is about Zheng He an inspirational Chinese explorer, who was determined to find the vivid blue pigment for painting porcelains.

Year 3 students were set up to make their own paint and to use as much natural pigment as possible to make a range of colours.

After a paint-base from flour, salt and water was made, students added different coloured spices to create the primary colours. From there, students were free to mix and blend to make the colours they wanted.

The more the groups worked together, the wider the range of colours they created. The results were fantastic. The salt added a little sparkle to their paintings of Zheng He.





'Maths in action!'

Which container holds the most rice? Which items are heavy or light?

These are some of the key questions our nursery children have been trying to answer in their Mathematics lessons this week. To explore these answers, we make our Maths lessons 'come to life' as much as possible as children thrive through experiencing learning that is active, practical, and hands-on.

The Scoop in Year 2!

Y2 children became very bossy and demanding! They were telling each other what to do and ordering them about! Before you wonder why, it's because we have been learning about the features of instructional text; one of them being bossy or imperative verbs.

We also made a thaumatrope toy, an optical toy that was popular during the 19th century. The children had to follow a set of instructions to make this toy. This gave the children a good, practical understanding of seeing for themselves how important it is to give clear instructions.

After making this toy, the children wrote a set of instructions on how to make their version of the toy, using commas for the list, bullet points or numbers for the steps, time adverbs and bossy verbs. They also included others features, such as a 'How To...' title, introduction, pictures and a top tip. Why don't you have a go at building this clever toy? Follow the instructions below to make one.



Student Council

The BSG student voice committee have been discussing the ASA programme, including activities that are going well and possible areas for improvement for Term 3. All classes from years 1-6 had representatives to voice their opinions to the rest of the committee and the student council decided on resolutions and further questions to take to PLT. We asked if it was possible for different ASAs to be added to the current programme including: gardening, more arts and crafts, cooking and more sports. With the help of Ms Elsmore, we are now looking into hosting these ASAs for term 3.

Secondly, the students felt it was important to have the opportunity to choose their own ASA during a discussion with their parents. It was noted that the ASA list will be released on a Friday afternoon and the sign-up will open on a Sunday morning. Therefore, discussions could be held between parents and students over the weekend on which ASA they would like to take part in. Lastly, I would like to say thank you to all of the students for having open and honest conversations with the help of class teachers.

Reception D at New Campus NAIS

We engaged in a variety of Chinese New Year activities, including role playing with traditional costumes, reading stories about the lunar new year, making delicious baozis and especially enjoyed creating some wonderful decorations that we were all keen to take home. As part of celebrating the Year of the Tiger, we even had a surprise visit from our very own NAIS tiger who read a special story to the children, 'Tiger' by Nick Butterworth!

We have been trying to use a variety of resources, and language activities at the same time, to enhance our learning of our core text, 'Whatever Next' by Jill Murphy.

It was pure joy when we discovered what we could do with junk modelling and how we can use some of the materials to also enact the story and play out the main characters. What better fun to get in a box (rocket) and pretend to go to the moon?! The students also tried to further extend their learning by creating their own comic strips, trying to use speech bubbles, as part of our English lesson.

Teeth Experts

In Year 4, the children have been learning about the digestive system and in particular the importance of teeth in the process of biting, chewing, ripping and grinding food. The students can now tell you everything there is to know about teeth, including the names and functions of the different types of teeth, as well as the constant changes that happen in our mouths as milk teeth give way to adult teeth. The children also got to make a clay set of teeth and are in the process of preparing videos for younger students about 'The most effective way to brush our teeth'. The next step is to understand why herbivores, carnivores and omnivores have different teeth sizes and how this is connected to their role in the food chain. If you have any questions about teeth, ask a Year 4 child who will be more than happy to help you!

Common Language Champions

In Year 1 and 2, we have been celebrating the students who consistently try to use the common language at the school. Using English includes everyone, and children are strongly encouraged to use it if they can. When children are not able to use English, their learning is scaffolded using a variety of strategies and they can work with a buddy who speaks the same first language. However, we strongly encourage our students to use English during social interactions as this helps them make friends form other language backgrounds and gives them the opportunity to practise their English.

To promote this concept and encourage the students to try their best, we have introduced Common Language Champion vests.

Each week, a child who is trying hard to use the common language is chosen from each year 1 and year 2 class to wear the 'common language champion' vests. Here is our first round of champions and their smiles say it all!

Y3 Athletics House Competition

As a fun way to end our P.E. athletics unit, Year 3 students participated in a friendly athletics house competition. The competition was based around four main events: standing long jump, a 600m long distance run, 60M sprint and a howler-rocketthrow. Students applied learnt skills to beat their own personal best times and should be proud of their individual achievements and house spirit displayed throughout the event. During our year level assembly, certificates were awarded to the students who placed 1st, 2nd or 3rd in each event. STEAM Focus in Reception

Reception has been focussed on STEAM. We have used our cross-curricula inputs to introduce STEAM challenges and the children have had the opportunity to experiment with different resources to design and create exciting new things during active learning. We started with marble and domino runs, working independently and in small groups to achieve a goal. We then drew inspiration from Global Campus and our collaboration with MIT and decided to extend our learning to Rube Goldberg machines.

We have been creating our own at school and at home, and the most successful recorded attempts will be uploaded on Global Campus under the 'Ball in cup Rube Goldberg' challenge.

Internship at The Happy Monk

Last month, I, along with five others, worked as interns at The Happy Monk, a restaurant and bar, for a week. During this week, we learned many valuable experiences.

Our time was split between the office and the restaurants. In the office, we worked on a project we chose. In doing the project, we had to use real data from the company, do market research, and find out information from customers by doing surveys.

For example, my project was about replacing a pizza from the menu with another, and in doing that, my group had to find out information about competitors, get data from the company, and survey the customers about their pizza choices.

In the restaurants, we had to help out by cleaning dishes, making drinks, delivering food and drinks, clearing the tables, and other things typically done in a restaurant. A great benefit of doing this was improving interpersonal skills, since we had to speak to many customers that we had never met before.

On the last day, we presented our projects. Due to careful planning and meticulous research, the presentations went smoothly. I would greatly recommend this to anyone, irrespective of future career choices.
