"This house believes every child must learn a musical instrument"

"Hello to fellow students and teachers,

The Chinese philosopher Confucius once said, "Music produces a kind of pleasure which the human nature cannot do without."

Music brings joy to many and with that, improves many skills. Unlike the majority, I am *for* the motion and believe that every child must learn a musical instrument.

Arguments have stated that music does not make you any better and learning how to play and instrument is merely just wasting time, however, I **disagree** with this for the following reasons:

Firstly, it fosters **self-expression** and relieves stress. Similar to art, a musician can play a piece with emotion, like how artist paints their emotions on a canvas. This has proven to relieve stress and music therapy has been useful in treating children with autism, depression and other disorders. Some students are sometimes pressured and stressed by the work load given to them; music could be theraputic for them, and that gives them a retreat.

Secondly, learning a musical instrument teaches children **discipline** and develops **perseverance**. Learning to play an instrument needs time and effort, and disciplines musicians as learning how to play an instrument would have some challenging parts, as well as some which are not as hard. Practising and working on the hard parts instead of the easier parts requires discipline, as it would be tempting to give up.

Some arguments on this debate have stated that music does not make you cleverer, which leads me to my third argument.

Studies have shown that it increases your mathematical ability as reading music involves counting notes and rhythms which help math skills.

In addition to that, playing a musical instrument increases the capacity of your memory. Research has shown that playing an instrument stimulates the brain and increases your memory, and the parts of the brain that store your memory actually *grow and become more active*.

Moreover, playing a musical instrument also increases coordination. For example, when playing a piece, the brain must subconciously convert that note into specific motor patterns as well as paying attention to breathing and the rhythm.

My fourth argument is that music exposes children to cultural history. Often, music relfects its environment and times of its creation. Therefore, children would learn of multiple types of music, classical traditions, folk music and medieval among many others. Music can be a large part of history, and has backgrounds which can further your appreciation for different cultures.

However, music does not just improve your knowledge, it **also boosts your team skills**. Team skills are an important aspect to being successful in life, and playing an instrument requires
