ENGLISH



This term in English students will be completing work on the Roots of English with a 'The Canterbury Tales' class presentation, practising for the Canterbury Tales production and completing our short films based on Beowulf. We will then move onto a unit looking at general writing skills, focusing on topics such as writing effective sentences, adding structure and using punctuation accurately and effectively. In addition, students will continue work on the reading and writing for enjoyment programme.

## MATHS

Over the course of the next five weeks the pupils will be working on a mini project that will combine their mathematical skills with their geographical and historical knowledge as we look at the various methods of circumnavigating the Earth. We will compare historical times recorded by Phileas Fogg and Ferdinand Magellan against more modern methods such as the Vendee Globe event. Pupils will be required to convert between units of measure, use ratio and proportion and calculate compound measures in their work. We will also be judging weather Earth is a sphere, and egg or indeed something completely different by introducing and using  $Pi(\pi)$ . The half term will finish off with us revisiting algebra and the use of inequalities.

The aim this half term is to build on these successes.

Curriculum-wise, we are working on the following topics this term: Sexual Reproduction in Animals (Biology), Mixtures and Separation (Chemistry) and Current Electricity (Physics).



Our Science Department has now doubled since my last newsletter post. NAIS Science has a fantastic new Science Lab Technician, Mrs. Din. Marissa Din has worked for four years as a Science Lab Assistant at another top British International School in Hong Kong, and before that has worked in Malaysia, Singapore, Indonesia and Taiwan. # GEOGRAPHY

The outlook in the run up to Easter in Geography at NAIS HK is looking decidedly cooler as we move into studying glaciation and how ice has shaped and molded many of our natural landscapes. Before then our focus will be on developing an understanding of geological time (eons, eras, periods etc.) and the ways in which people on the planet have influenced our environment and how we continue to interact with the world around us. Prior to half term we looked at the development of our planet and solar system as well as life on earth and by the Easter holidays pupils should have been brought right up to date with the spread of modern day humans. A day out at Joss House Bay and Hong Kong Museum of History will compliment our studies. The trip will allow pupils to study the ancient geologic history of Hong Kong and the surrounding area and the migratory history of the people that have lived here. In addition, pupils will be given the opportunity to give their field sketching abilities a try.

# HISTORY

In History, students will complete their end of unit assessment on Medieval Britain, before moving onto our China in the Middle Ages topic. We will be examining topics such as Chinese beliefs, the Mongols conquest, Chinese inventions and examining the evidence from these times in Hong Kong through our trip to Joss House Bay and the Chinese History Museum. In addition to this, we will be looking for comparisons between China and other parts of this world at this time to prepare for our investigation of the Islamic world and the Crusades.

#### MANDARIN



Beginner pupils will focus on the topic of who we are and where we are. They will extend their bank of vocabulary on countries, directions, languages and Chinese culture. Through the on-line Mandarin Matrix and activities such as 'Around the world', Quizlet, memory games and survey activities they will be able to state their own country names and the languages they can speak. They will ask questions about the places they have been to and the places they want to go and will be able to ask what languages others speak.

Intermediate pupils will study more chapters which include《泰戈尔先生》、《京剧 大师梅兰芳》 and 《戴高乐临危不惧》.Through these chapters, they will be able to know more about essay structure and develop their critical thinking. Pupils will also learn how to write different types of essays.

Advanced pupils will study more chapters which include《三顾茅庐》、《匆匆》and 《桃花心木. Through these chapters, they will be able to analyse the characteristics of the characters from the passages. Pupils will also be able to use learnt writing skills in their essay.

#### SPANISH

In Spanish we are going to finish Modulo3 - Vamos al Instituto (School) In the second part of this subtopic, pupils will be able to use vocabulary and grammatical structures previously learned in order to produce an oral presentation on the school of their dreams – the main subtopics will be school buildings and transport.

Grammar wise we will continue practicing the present and will introduce the future tense for regular and irregular verb and a quick introduction to the past tense for regular verbs. Pupils will be assessed for Listening, Speaking, Reading and Writing in the 4<sup>th</sup> week of this half term.

We will finish spring term with a lesson about how Easter is celebrated in Spanish speaking countries.
