British Ambassador Opens New Science Labs

In February, Regents International School Pattaya was very pleased to welcome His Excellency the British Ambassador to Thailand, Mr Brian Davidson, who officially opened our state-of-the-art science laboratories. Accompanying Mr Davidson was Mr Marcus Winsley, Director of Trade and Investment. Other special guests included Dr Virachai, founder of Regents and Mr Noppasitcha Na Nakorn, Deputy Head of Education in Pattaya.

The new science labs at Regents are designed to enhance the students' learning experience in a subject area that is always advancing and evolving. The timing of the new labs coincides with an exciting Nord Anglia Education initiative which will shortly see Regents enjoying the fruits of a collaboration with MIT (Massachusetts Institute of Technology) to further inspire the students to acquire the skills needed for the 21st century.

The Ambassador's visit began with a tour of the school led by students and the Head of Primary, Karyn Walton and Head of Secondary, Michael Seaton. On the tour, the Ambassador met Y12 student Luke Daly who received the top mark in the world for IGCSE Design & Technology in 2016. Luke was able to present some of his designs when the tour stopped in the D&T Studio.

The Ambassador then met with senior science students who took the opportunity to explain some of their latest experiments and theories, before Acting Principal, Grant Gillies, invited the Ambassador to cut the ribbon to officially open the labs. It was then the turn of the Year 12 IB students to invite the Ambassador and Mr Winsley to a Q&A session - covering subjects ranging from BREXIT to terrorism, and from the 21st century workplace to a day in the life of an ambassador.

Mr Davidson clearly enjoyed his visit and was full of praise for all he had experienced: "A truly inspiring day spent at Regents. Amongst the many highlights - being shown around by confident and very informative Year 6 students; seeing the highly creative arts and design projects; opening the new science labs (which adds even more to the already fantastic facilities at the school); and being grilled on British foreign policy and life as a diplomat by some very sharp Year 12 students. I look forward to returning the favour and welcoming the students to the Embassy in Bangkok very soon."

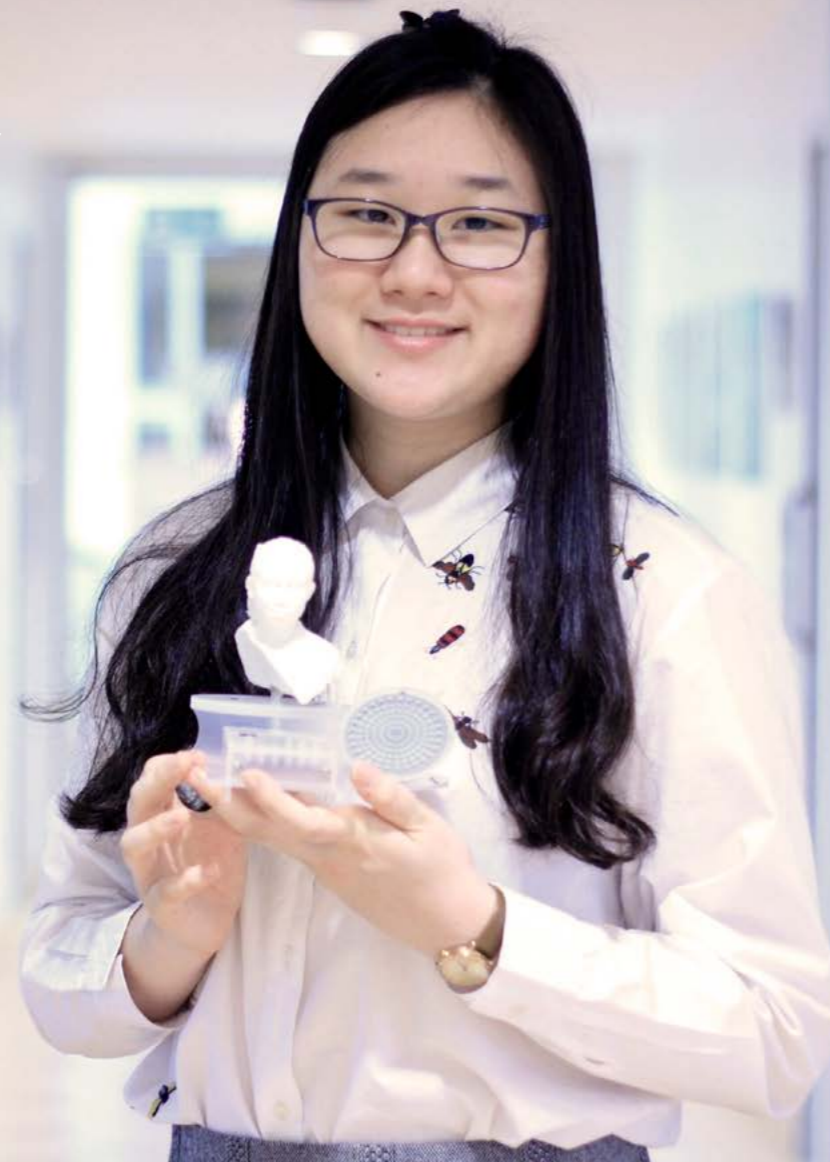
What do you do to relax?

Play tennis (quite badly), jog and swim. Connect with family and friends overseas. Love to travel.

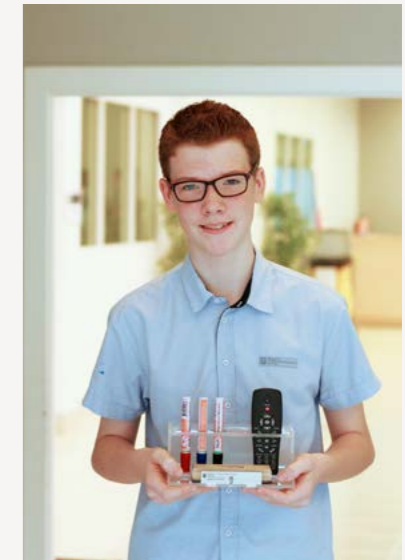
What are your hopes for Regents?

Prototype to Production

Year 9 Design & Technology student Jack Daly has taken a brief from Regents teachers who were frustrated at losing track of whiteboard pens, remote controls and interactive board pens, and turned it into a winning product. With positive feedback from Mr Spear and Mr Eagen who trialled the prototype in their classrooms, Jack then approached Acting Principal Mr Gillies for permission to produce multiple units. Jack has come full circle on the design project and understands very clearly what he and his classmates learned: "We learned how to create a product to meet the needs of a real community and how to turn a design into an innovation, adding value by optimising the design and preparing it for the market." An added benefit of the project is that all profits will go to Jack's chosen charity, Agape Day Care Home, which cares for vulnerable children in Pattaya.

A Yearbook for the Blind

It was a very special day when Regents Year 13 student, Dayoung Min, presented her Design & Technology invention to Got, a student at Father Ray's School for the Blind.

The invention uses the latest digital technology to capture images and sound recordings of students at the school, in what is perhaps best described as a 3D yearbook for the blind. Essentially, the project is a 3D printed model of the student which is held on a detachable platform. The model contains electronics and a user interface which are used to record and play messages of the student. The combination of touch and sound is used to trigger memories of a close friend, colleague, teacher or a loved one.

Dayoung got the idea when enjoying the Regents Yearbook and tried to consider how blind students might access memories of

their time at school. She explains: "Since blind people cannot visually interpret two dimensional photographs, they struggle to recall some of their memories." Dayoung found the whole experience to be a huge learning curve: "Throughout the process, I had to come up with creative and yet analytical strategies to solve problems. I had to constantly think about the possible options I could choose in advancing the product, and analyse them to understand which one was the most suitable." To this end, Dayoung is very grateful to the Head of D&T, Mr Daly, D&T Teacher Mr Smith and also her classmates for their advice and feedback.

However, Dayoung believes the greatest reward from doing the project was the feeling she received from helping others: "I was very proud that I helped Got to have a new experience which can also possibly help other

blind people to share the experience as well in the future."



Global Finalist in Google Science Fair

Head Girl, Saliha Rehanaz describes being chosen as a Global Finalist in the Google Science Fair 2016, as "a dream come true". Apart from visiting the Google Headquarters in San Francisco, California, highlights for Saliha included eating pancakes made by robots and meeting other talented teenagers who are making the world a better place with science. As just one of 16 finalists chosen from thousands of projects from around the world, Saliha's achievement is indeed impressive.

Saliha's product is called Sreshto Menstrual Pads. Sreshto are eco-friendly sanitary napkins which take only two years to bio-degrade. Saliha explains: "On average, one woman uses 12-16,000 menstrual pads in her lifetime. One pad takes over five centuries to degrade. When I found out about this, I realised what a major problem this was to our environment. Not only were landfills being flooded with

menstrual pads, they were also a major cause for many deadly diseases, because they are an optimum place for microorganisms to grow." Incorporating her sister's idea of using natural and chemical-free absorbents, Saliha created Sreshto using jute and coconut husk.

Besides helping the environment, Saliha says that Sreshto aims to make female hygiene products accessible to women all over the world; "I hope to create jobs for women by allowing them to make Sreshto and sell them to other women in their local communities. Sreshto also encourages women and girls to continue their work and education, because around the world, on average, over 120 days of work and school are missed due to periods. Sreshto aims to break the perception that menstruation is a social taboo and start the conversation among the youth, so more people are aware of these problems."

Ayushi Prakash: 'This trip gave me a lot of confidence and taught me to be independent. I also learned a lot about the country of Nepal.'

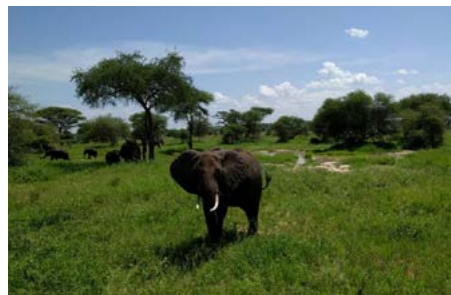

Tanzania - Impactful Service

In January, a group of Year 12 students along with Mrs Neylon and Miss Felts travelled to Tanzania to take part in an exciting, informative, thought-provoking and uplifting service trip.

The group took the opportunity to build goat sheds, smokeless stoves and even install solar lighting for local families who were living in conditions of total poverty - a new and humbling experience for all participants. The students also helped the Nord Anglia Education partner charity Seeway to improve the educational prospects for local children by building desks for a local school, helping to build classrooms and installing windows and doors in teachers' accommodation.

This was all topped off by an amazing two day safari in Tarangire National Park, which included a night of wild camping. The students saw a huge range of animals, honed some wildlife photography skills, and learned from their guide about the wildlife and the way of life for local tribes such as the Maasai.

Students and teachers arrived back in Thailand with the realisation that they are all well-off, healthy citizens with a great education and precious opportunities. Many students commented that their experience had profoundly affected them, and that impactful service work is something they definitely want to do again, perhaps even playing a role in their future careers.

Virtual Choir

connect with over 40 other schools in our NAE family, the Global Campus will boast the world's largest virtual school choir. For the Love of Music - An Interview with Juilliard's Kathryn Andersen

Our Juilliard curriculum specialist, Kathryn Andersen, talks about her passion for music, and how our Juilliard collaboration enriches the musical life at Regents.

Kathryn, please tell us about your earliest memory of being drawn to music.

As a child, my mother would often play music for me as I was going to sleep and waking up. In the mornings, she'd come into the room, draw up the shades and sing, "Good morning to you! Good morning to you! We're all in our places with sunny faces. And this is the way to start a new day." I can still hear her voice singing the melody and feel the sun shining on me. What better way to start the day than with music?

How much was music a part of your life throughout school?

I was fortunate to discover my love of the violin and music thanks to my first violin teacher, Alla Zernitskaya. She emigrated from Russia and began a stringed instrument programme

in the public schools in my town. I remember her visiting my classroom and playing for my class in third grade. I fell in love with the sound of the violin. I ran home from school that day and told my parents, "I want to play the violin!" Not long after, I started taking lessons and music has been part of my life ever since. In sixth grade, I started to attend string orchestra rehearsals before school every day - at 6:45am! In addition, I often had an ensemble class or lesson during school a few times a week.

What has being a musician taught you?

Over twenty years as a musician has taught me how to listen. As artists, we work to express genuine human experiences and emotions and the ways each person does this are unique and beautiful. Even if we speak a different language or live in a different country, we are united by a love of music. Music has the

incredible ability to bring people together and create opportunities for true connections.

What has been one of the biggest challenges in your career to date?

It's not always easy to pick up your instrument and go to the practice room every day. The rigour and dedication needed to develop your technical and musical skills can be difficult at times. I find inspiration from other musicians and try to get together with friends whenever possible to read chamber music or attend concerts.

How has being part of The Juilliard School enhanced your career?

Not only do I work for Juilliard now as a Music Curriculum Specialist, but I also attended the school as a graduate. While a student there,

I studied with Ron Copes of the Juilliard String Quartet. He is an incredible musician, dedicated teacher, and inspiring mentor. I was also surrounded by other colleagues who were passionate about improving their skills as performing artists. Being in classes and rehearsals with my friends each day motivated and helped me make great progress. As an alumna of Juilliard, I stay in touch with many friends and made connections with other alumni. The music world is quite small so no matter where the concert may be, I seem to find myself among other Juilliard musicians!

Describe a typical visit to Regents?

Although I'm on campus for just three days, the music team and I make the most of the time together. The schedule is always quite busy as I love to observe classes, teach some lessons myself, and, most importantly, meet with the music teachers to discuss the Juilliard-Nord Anglia Performing Arts Programme and teaching practices. We're always working to come up with fun and engaging activities for your students!

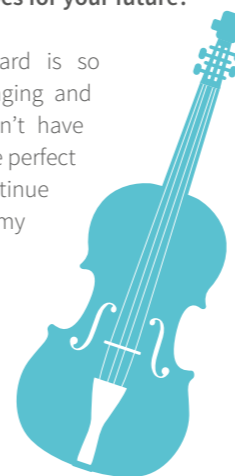
What is the best piece of advice you have received during your career?

The first time I performed at Carnegie Hall - I was probably 15 or 16 years old - my youth orchestra, the Empire State Youth Orchestra, was on tour in New York City. The concert was just beginning and as concertmaster, I was about to walk on stage to tune the orchestra. Before the door opened, however, my conductor stopped me and said: "Take a moment and look around. This is Carnegie Hall." Since then, I've performed in numerous concert halls with many different musicians but I always try to remind myself to take a moment to appreciate the experience.

I never want to forget how fortunate I am to be spending my life doing what I love.

What are your hopes for your future?

My work at Juilliard is so interesting, challenging and rewarding, I couldn't have dreamed up a more perfect job. I hope to continue working to share my love of music - improving the quality of music education and reaching as many students as I can!

EAL - Rising to the Challenge

Starting at a new school is a challenge for any child, but when you have a limited grasp of the language of instruction, then it becomes an even bigger challenge. Thankfully, Regents is well placed to support these students with its excellent EAL provision.

Head of Secondary EAL, Mr David Puckey explains; "We offer English tuition which is tailored to the needs of each child. That includes immersion programmes, in which the students are supported to remain in mainstream National Curriculum lessons alongside their English-speaking peers to ensure rapid progress in an English-rich environment. It also includes intensive programmes, in which small groups of students receive intensive language teaching combined with the learning through English of Science, Geography and History."

"In Secondary, intensive specialist courses,

like our distinctive and highly-successful REAL and RISE programmes, are designed to improve the language skills of students who have only beginner level English to the point where they can undertake the IB Diploma and GCSE qualifications with a high degree of confidence. For students with more advanced English, we provide qualified and experienced in-class support for them to learn within mainstream English National Curriculum lessons."

"Having been at Regents for over 10 years, and having worked extensively in both Primary and now Secondary, I have enjoyed seeing so many of our children flourish as a direct result of their English language development. The belief and confidence that they gain, enabling them to express themselves authentically, is probably the most important and rewarding aspect of the EAL programmes throughout the school."



Work Hard, Play Hard

Regents continues to defy the declining global boarding trend with its growing, international community and Head of Boarding, Mr Steven Rand, is very sure of the reasons why: "We are an established, experienced, well-equipped community on a large green countryside site, well away from the busy streets of Bangkok, yet close enough to make travel to us easier than to many areas within the city. We offer

fantastic supervised trips at weekends and our sporting facilities provide excellent opportunities after homework is complete each evening." 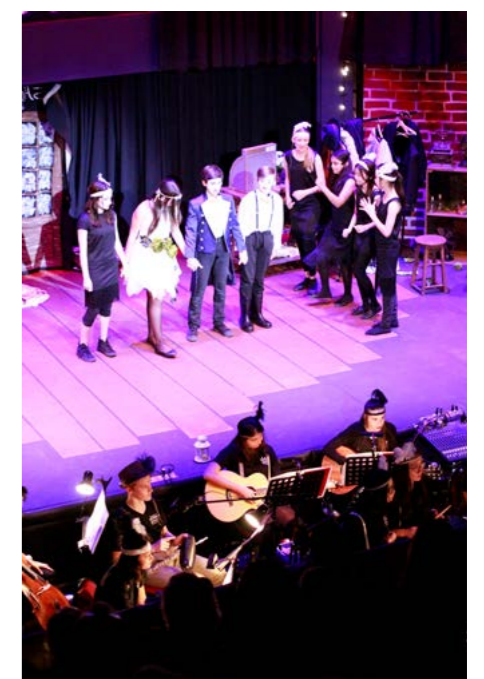
ONCE Upon a Time

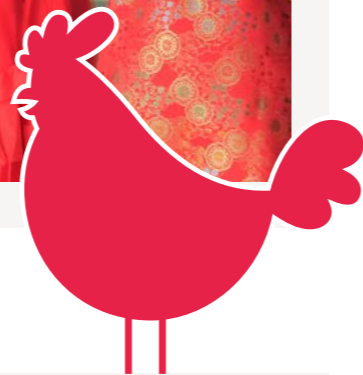
IB Art Exhibition

Andy now looks back on an extraordinary sporting career as a triple Paralympian, three-time European gold medallist and former captain of the Great Britain wheelchair rugby team. Andy, along with Ryan Barnett from the Father Ray Foundation, spoke to students across the Primary and Secondary schools, encouraging them to take positives from everything in life.

Andy believes that:

- Success is achieved through hard work and perseverance
- Everyone has the qualities they need to be the best they can be, but nothing will change unless you change it
- You should only do the things that make you happy, give 100% to whatever you do, and take opportunities as they arise

Shopping list

- 500 g plain flour
- 6 tablespoons olive oil (or lard)
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon baking powder
- 300ml lukewarm water (adjust as needed)
- Fillings such as parma ham or salami, Cheeses such as mozzarella, vegetables such as tomatoes, roasted pumpkin, zucchini or marinated vegetables; and spreads such as pesto, tapenade

Why not try... Italian Piadine and join our parents cooking classes this term?

Method: Place flour, baking powder and salt in a large mixing bowl. Drizzle over the olive oil and begin to mix the dough. Start adding the water bit by bit, kneading the dough as you go. Add just enough water to make a smooth but firm dough. Knead for approx. 15mins then allow to rest for another 15mins (wrap in cling film). Divide the dough into six equal pieces, then roll out thinly into circles (about 8 inches). Heat a cast iron griddle or a non-stick

frying pan (coated with cooking spray) until nice and hot. Place a piadina on the griddle/pan and cook until light brown spots begin to appear on the dough. Turn-over and cook the other side. Once all are cooked and ready for filling return to pan, add your favourite fillings, place another piadina on top and lightly cook until ingredients are heated through, flipping over once. Cut with a pizza wheel and enjoy!

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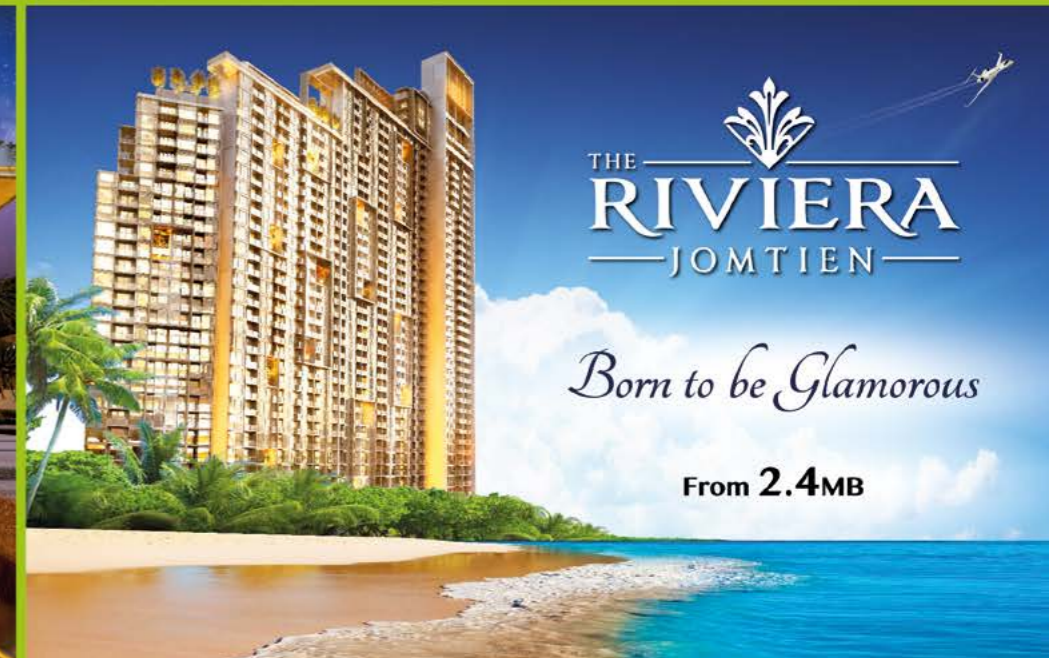


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
