




Different Learning Styles

Need pictures to support their recall e.g. giving directions is no good, a diagram is needed

Visual timers – like the example we showed you

Coloured pens/highlighters

Coloured timetables

Illustrations

Learning maths – number lines, objects, numicon, board games, smart board, ipads

Post it notes all over house as reminders


Note taking

Flashcard maker programmes on ipad/PC


Highlighting information in different colours



Mind maps – help pupils 'see' links between items.

Pictures act as 'hooks' to help recall things. The more 'hooks' you have, the easier it is to recall things.

Mental images can act as 'hooks'.



Auditory learners – links to sounds

Recorded notes/stories

Listening to others talking

Mnemonics that they can say and recall

Revise out loud

Talking partners

Especially important for language learning as we are an international school

Kinesthetic learners

- -Practical
- -Don't need DIY guides can just 'do it'
- -Learn by doing reading or listening to someone else isn't enough
- -Need to manipulate objects
- -Revision walk and talk
- -Revise with others
- -Highlighting information

We can be bits of both depending on the task.

Good to have an awareness of our preferred learning styles

In education, we try to cater for all by using a multi sensory approach e.g.

Learning how to write – chalk board, paint, finger/shaving cream, sand tray, tracing letters

Making words – manipulating physical letters, 'sand tray' app, writing in sand etc

Importance of valuable feedback – if your child isn't getting it change the method for a different result.
