#### Old rings for new limbs

We all have opened a soft drink can before. We pull the ring, throw it away and continue to enjoy the drink, unmindful of the good use this small pull ring can be put to.

At St Andrews you can contribute to a good cause and collect ring pulls, which will be donated at the end of the year to The Prostheses Foundation of H.R.H. These pull rings, when melted down, provide the base aluminium metal that is used in making artificial limbs for amputees. The aluminium is needed to connect the three parts of the leg – the sockets, shin and feet.

So for a small, good deed on our part at St Andrews, it can make a huge difference to people less fortunate than ourselves, through the improved quality of life they will gain from being able to walk again.

So please place your ring pulls in the bottles which are positioned next to the Sports Hall as you enter school. For the added incentive of collecting, it will also be a House competition and points will be awarded when they reach different levels in the tubes. So get collecting!



#### **Books of the Week**

High School Fiction: I'm not scared (by Niccolò Ammaniti)



The hottest summer of the twentieth century. A tiny community of five houses enclosed by wheat fields. While the adults shelter indoors, six children venture out on their bikes across the scorched, deserted countryside. Whilst exploring a dilapidated

and uninhabited farmhouse, nine-year-old Michele Amitrano discovers a secret so momentous, so terrible, that he dare not tell anyone about it. To come to terms with what he has found, Michele has to draw strength from his own sense of humanity. It is Ammaniti's ability to inhabit the mind and perspective of his young hero that makes I'm Not Scared such an affecting and extraordinary novel. (Recommended for age 15+)

## KINDLE High School fiction: Sliding Beneath the Surface: [The St. Augustine Trilogy, Book I] (by Doug Dillon)




In America's oldest and most haunted city, St. Augustine, Florida, teenager Jeff Golden is in trouble. Horrible dreams won't let him sleep, and he is up to his eyeballs in terrifying, paranormal experiences.

Finally, Jeff turns to his girlfriend Carla, and Lobo, the mysterious Native American shaman, for help. But what he discovers is a lot more than he bargained for. A ghostly presence linked to a local historic cemetery is not only threatening Jeff's sanity but his life as well. And before he knows what's happening, Jeff finds both himself and Carla pulled into one of the nastiest and most bloody events in Florida history. It is a place from which they may never escape.



### <u>High School Non- Fiction (age 16+)</u>: Zero Degrees of Empathy: A new theory of human cruelty

(by Simon Baron-Cohen)



Simon Baron-Cohen, expert in autism and developmental psychopathology, has always wanted to isolate and understand the factors that cause people to treat others as if they were mere objects. In this book he proposes a radical shift, turning the focus away from evil and on to the central factor, empathy.

Unlike the concept of evil, he argues, empathy has real explanatory power. Putting empathy under the microscope he explores four new ideas: firstly, that we all lie somewhere on an empathy spectrum, from high to low, from six degrees to zero degrees. Secondly that, deep within the brain lies the 'empathy circuit'. How this circuit functions determines where we lie on the empathy spectrum. Thirdly, that empathy is not only something we learn but that there are also genes associated with empathy. And fourthly, while a lack of empathy leads to mostly negative results, is it always negative? Full of original research, Zero Degrees of Empathy presents a new way of understanding what it is that leads individuals down negative paths, and challenges all of us to consider replacing the idea of evil with the idea of empathyerosion.

# <u>Primary Fiction:</u> The case of the Cambridge Mummy (Slightly Jones Mystery) (by Joan Lennon)



An ancient curse has been let loose in cold wintry Cambridge. Priceless artefacts are found mysteriously crushed to dust at the Fitzwilliam Museum, long-dead Egyptian queens stalk the corridors of the Girton College – but what do bicycles and bloomers have to do with it all?

Slightly Jones is faced with her most bewildering case yet and her most ruthless opponents. Can she find the answer in time, or will it be a bleak midwinter for everyone?

## <u>Primary Non- Fiction:</u> The Dangerous Book for Boys (by Gonn and Hal Iggulden)



Not one of our newest book but still very popular with boys – I wonder why! If ever there were a book to make you switch off your television set, The Dangerous Book for Boys is it.

How many other books will help you thrash someone at conkers, race your own go-cart, and identify the best quotations from Shakespeare? The Dangerous Book for Boys gives you facts and figures at your fingertips – swot up on the solar system, learn about famous battles and read inspiring stories of incredible courage and bravery. Teach your old dog new tricks. Make a pinhole camera. Understand the laws of cricket. There's a whole world out there: with this book, anyone can get out and explore it. The Dangerous Book for Boys is written with the verve and passion that readers of Conn Iggulden's number one bestselling novels have come to expect. This book, his first non-fiction work, has been written with his brother as a celebration of the long summers of their youth and as a compendium of information so vital to men of all ages.

Chapters in The Dangerous Book for Boys include: The Seven Ancient Wonders of the World, Conkers, Laws of Football, Dinosaurs, Fishing, Juggling, Timers and Tripwires, Kings and Queens, Famous Battles, Spies, Making Crystals, Insects and Spiders, Astronomy, Girls, The Golden Age of Piracy, Secret Inks, Patron Saints of Britain, Skimming Stones, Dog Tricks, Making a Periscope, Coin Tricks, Marbles, Artillery, The Origin of Words and The Solar System.

Rolf, a small, gentle wolf, lives with Mrs.
Boggins, who tells him he is a good little wolf.
But when he meets up with a large, ferocious wolf, he is told that he isn't a real wolf. Wolves aren't little and good—they are big and bad.
To prove he is a real wolf, the old wolf tells

Rolf he must perform certain tasks, such as blowing down a little pig's house. Rolf is a total failure . . . until the big bad wolf urges him to do something unspeakable to old Mrs. Boggins. Then the good little wolf proves that he can stand up to the big bad bully. Or so it seems. More mature readers may find a different ending that could lead to a great discussion!
