The EAL Aims

- Build English confidence and competence
- Support the transition from social English to academic English







- Placement test
- Observation period
- Foundation Tier (F3)
- Year 1 & 2 Tier levels 1, 2 or 3 or no EAL
- Ongoing assessment using EAL tracking documents
- Regular Class teacher discussions
- Reviewed at the end of each term (with class teacher and EAL HOD)







- Foundation: 3 hours approx. per week.
- Tier 1: 7 hours approx. per week.
- Tier 2: 5 hours approx. per week.
- Tier 3: 3 hours per week.

- Withdrawals
- In-class support
- Speaking, listening, reading, writing, vocabulary, sentence structure and grammar
- Fluency and confidence
- Withdrawals linked to class curriculum
- Student-centred

Making Mistakes




- Let your child make mistakes
- The more mistakes they make, the faster they will learn
- Allow your child to self-correct themselves
- Ask: What do you think? Why do you think that?
