Andy Briggs is a screenwriter, graphic novelist and author, who has also worked on movie projects with Warner Bros. His graphic novels include Kong: King of Skull Island, Ritual and Dinocorps. He has also rebooted the classic character Tarzan, with a series of contemporary books Tarzan: The Greystoke Legacy, Tarzan: The Jungle Warrior, and Tarzan: The Savage Lands. 




Judging Upper Secondary entries will be Georgina Harding, the author of three novels: The Solitude of Thomas Cave, The Spy Game and, most recently, Painter of Silence, which was shortlisted for the Orange Prize for Fiction 2012. Her first book was a word of non-fiction, In Another Europe, recording a journey she made across Romania in 1988 during the worst times of the Ceausescu regime. It was followed by Tranquebar: A Season in South India, which documented the lives of the people in a small fishing village on the Coromandel coast. Georgina Harding lives in London and on a farm in the Stour Valley, Essex in the UK.

Judging your illustrations will be **Matthew Loffhagen**, an award-winning professional illustrator who specialises in cartoons, comics and bright fun artwork. He was born in England but moved to Hong Kong when he was a teenager, and studied Comic Art as part of his degree. Matthew started drawing when he was very young and has never stopped. In school he would get in trouble for doodling in maths lessons, but he insists that he's a better listener when he's drawing something! After years of practice he began working as a professional artist in 2012. He regularly creates vibrant and colourful new artwork for book covers, and also illustrates

an online comic strip, MagiPunk, which can be seen at www.magipunk.com. Matthew has created a special illustration, just for us! His 'Somewhere unforgettable', is his favourite
