- The month of November starts on a high note with two great results for ACAMIS U19 boys' volleyball and girls' football teams. Plus, the school will most likely break a Maths World Record, depending subject to the final review of the Guinness World RecordTM.
- International Day was considered to be one of the best events yet. Children, parents
 and staff have all given it two thumbs up. A few things will make it an even better
 experience: to have more musical performances, to double check the flags and
 nationalities, have more games in all stalls, get better prepared in primary for
 primary's questions.
- Christmas Market is still in need for volunteers to make cookie bags, jams
 (containers are available at Chatterbox), and volunteers to sell at the stall, and also
 to make and sell mulled wine and waffles. Sew Gorgeous will handle the crafts stall
 and the money raised will go to Love & Hope charity.
- Secret Santa Shoppe will be held November 30 to December 3. Parents and teachers will only be allowed to shop on the last day. Volunteers will start shopping on TaoBao on November 11 and will go to Tian Yi Market on November 18. A bus will take them to the market leaving the school at 8:30am. Volunteers will be separated into the following groups Textile, Jewelry, Chinese items, Toys, Stationary and others. Most gifts will be pre-wrapped on November 25 and 26.

 this and check who can centralize information.
- In January, the school will create a group to study the cost of BSB's sport, music, art and academic teams. Costs to participate in these competitions have gone up and

some parents cannot afford to send their children to some of the events. Mr. Puttock has asked for a survey regarding some of the issues and the group will study some alternatives, such as sponsorship.
