Message from the Principal

I am very pleased to note that this year's International Day was an incredible success, with our biggest ever attendance of over 3,700 people, and that it raised over 150,000RMB for our chosen charity, Hopeful Hearts. This day ran incredibly smoothly, and I am sure you will join me in congratulating our facilities team, our staff, our parent support groups and Jean, our events manager, on doing such an amazing job.



As we reached the end of November, we started searching for highly-qualified teachers who share our values for August 2020. This year, we are also advertising for an additional Head of Primary to manage the new school. The successful candidate will work alongside Matthew Cox, our current Head of Primary, to ensure that we have the same curriculum, policies and assessment procedures across both sites.

In January, our Primary and EYFS teachers will be given an opportunity to visit the Nord Anglia International School Guangzhou, and will then be asked to provide us with an indication of their preferred location for next year. The new site is designed and built to meet the needs of younger students and boasts some excellent facilities including:

- Dedicated theatre
- Large gymnasium
- Two dedicated canteens for EYFS and Primary students
- STFAM Lab
- Music and instrumental suites
- Large dance studio
- Primary Art studio
- Indoor swimming pool
- Underground parking area for parents
- Indoor play area for EYFS, which opens out onto an enclosed playground courtyard

With 4 form entry throughout and a maximum capacity of 800, we expect demand to outstrip supply and will be inviting current parents to view the new school once the handover is completed at the end of March. I am keen to emphasise that we will continue to offer EYFS and Primary places at our current campus at South Lake for those parents who want it, with the exception of Toddlers, which will only be offered at the new Olympic Park Campus. We will be providing parents with lots more information between now and the opening, and would also encourage you to follow this **link for FAQs and a video tour!**

One growing feature at Nord Anglia is an increasing number of regional competitions. In November, we were very excited to welcome students from across the China region to complete in the inaugural Academic Olympiad. This event was an opportunity for friendly competition with other NAE schools and also an opportunity to show off our wonderful campus in the November sunshine.

I would like to once again congratulate our Secondary staff and students on achieving an impressive set of IGCSE and A Level results, which are well above the UK averages. I would also like to congratulate the following students for their impressive individual achievements:

- Best IGCSE English Language in China Princy Mehal
- Best IGCSE Psychology in China Princy Mehal

A true school community

Over the past two years BSG has been working hard to ensure that its Community Partnership is one that is effective, in the community and gives pupils the highest exposure to community projects as possible. We live in a community in China that can often need our support. We have worked with our key school Charities and our Community Partnership Leaders are really making a difference. They will go into the community and take part in events as well as host, organise and run events here at school to raise awareness, resources and monies. We have given our self the aim to increase to work that we do as a whole school so you will now see some of the events on a whole school scale. We often underestimate the power of a young person in a leadership role as you can see below they are making a huge difference.

This year so far...

Helping the Homeless

This project is an ongoing link that BSG have been working with for the second year now. Currently we have students delivering food, toiletries, clothes and essentials to the homeless on a Monday morning before school. This project allows pupils to support others that need a little extra help. On a Saturday and Sunday, we have a dedicated team of staff that support the distribution of food, each day we go over 100 meals are given out.

"Every Monday morning before school starts, a group of students attend the Feeding the Homeless programme, who walk around Tianhe offering breakfasts and other necessities for the homeless. I was lucky enough to attend, and it was an extremely valuable experience. When we started our walk, I was staggered by the amount of people who were sleeping on the streets. We placed the breakfasts beside the sleeping people, as well as shampoos, toothbrushes, and clothes, that allowed them to get through their day. Some woke up, and the looks on their faces made it clear that they thought they were still dreaming! As we walked around, we felt extremely privileged; it was a truly humbling experience."











Halloween Dress up and Movie Night

As a school this year both primary and secondary school took part in Halloween Dress up day with the young leaders advertising and collecting in the monies raised. The day finished off with a highly successful movie night seeing 80 secondary school students and 120 primary school students staying to watch scary movies. These events were run by the young leaders and really did a great job.

Supporting local Events

Our leaders are often asked to support local events to ensure that they are able to run effectively and to give their times to others, these have included British Day, Sports Events, Winter Festival, International Day and many more.

"Last Saturday, people came to Canton Place to celebrate British Day. As a partnership leader, I got to help out at the BSG stall along with other partnership leaders. We supervised games, painted faces, stuck tattoos and sold bubble wands. It was extremely fun and very satisfying to see all the money that we raised for hopeful hearts, the charity that all the proceeds of the day went to."

Huiling Special Needs School

We have now made an effective partnership with a special needs school in Guangzhou and year 10 and 11 pupils are attending the school once a week to support the work that is being done at the school. Each week when we walk around the corner and can see the pupils poking their heads through the fences waiting for are arrival there is a positive feeling that shows what the young leaders are doing is making a difference to pupils that would not normally get this experience.

"The Year 10 and 11 students who chose PE leadership now have a chance to visit Huiling school - a special needs school that we could only visit a few times last year. Now, we are able to go every Wednesday, and be able to make more bonds with the students, and understand what they want. Last Wednesday, we went on the first visit, and brought some PE equipment as well as some musical instruments for them to play with. We spent an hour learning their names and playing various different games with them, and by the time the hour had finished, everyone had a smile on their faces."

Hopeful Hearts

As one of our main charities Hopeful Hearts have supported student understanding by delivering assemblies across the school. We have also seen Harriett the Heart making a few appearances around school.

Hospital Visit

As part of UNICEF's World Childers Day BSG Community Leaders will go to Guangzhou's Children's Hospital and entertain and support children that are in the process of having non-uniform day, it takes longer to learn the importance of where it goes.





The competition started first thing on Friday morning with the maths section of the Olympiad. The tension in the room was electric as each child sat an individual test for an hour. With a quick shuffle round of tables, it was straight into the team maths challenge, followed by some in depth data analysis. After 3 solid hours of number crunching it was time for a hearty lunch... brain fuel for the afternoon.

The afternoon session was the Humanities section. The geography based task involved naming landmarks, capital cities and flags. I am still stunned as the speed in which both our Navy and Teal team whizzed through this challenge – the flags all became one blur to me as they matched them with such speed and accuracy. The day was finished with a 'fun' quiz. All the children were mixed up as an opportunity to make friends and wind down.

Day 2 was just as intense. The earlier start was dedicated to the history side of the Humanities challenge, based around in-depth knowledge of the Roman Empire. Both BSG teams again stampeded their way through this task. I really don't know how their brains managed to retain so many facts, names and dates – I mean, they only have little heads!



The rest of the day was the logic and reasoning style challenges. This was where team work was vitally important. I can honestly say I have never felt prouder of a group of children for the maturity and team spirit they showed here, especially after such long and intense days. The final challenge was the Rubik Cube speed challenge. One member form each team was selected to compete. Hua Quan Village is an art and cultural community located in Dragon Tiger Mountain, one of China's beautiful UNESCO World Heritage Sites. The village was created as a place for all people to create their own personalised journey of creative exploration. Workshops run by artists allowed students to engage with oil painting, photography, calligraphy, and ceramics, as well as traditional cooking, tai chi and a visit to the cultural museum. One of our favourites was definitely found in ceramics, where students used a potter's wheel to make vases and bowls of many shapes, sizes and success rates! We also took inspiration from the surrounding landscapes when painting using oils on canvas, building colours and compositions bravely over the afternoon. Our students were an absolute pleasure to have on the trip.

They took on challenges with open minds and creative drive – a wonderful representation of the school and parents. Its fair to say, our week was packed full of amazing activities, making friends, eating lots of food and reflecting on the days' events - we cannot wait for the details of next year's festival!











Visiting artist & the Big Draw!

October was another very busy month in the art department. We were really fortunate to have Leanne Claxton, a textiles and visual artist, visit us to run a whole day workshop for Year 11, 12 and 13 art students. Leanne has produced some wonderful floral designs for Zara Home, Esprit and Disney to mention just a few. She states that her workshops "are designed to inspire, challenge and extend creative practice", and there was certainly no shortage of creativity during the workshop. Students utilised both their own and Leanne's drawings of flowers and plants, and after experimenting with different coloured inks, transferred both their drawings and their wonderful colour palettes onto fabric using our brand-new heat-transfer machine. The results were outstanding and the excitement and creative energy was tangible in the room, as students saw their drawings come to life with the vibrant colours of the inks reacting to the heat. Some of the experiments produced have since become part of students' sketchbooks, linking into their exploratory theme of 'Natural Forms', whilst finished pieces were put on display as part of the 'Arts Celebration Evening' in November.

October also saw the excitement and colour that comes with The Big Draw, welcomed back to BSG for the fifth year running! Students from years 7-10 took part in a selection of spectacular activities, driven by the theme of 'Drawn to Life', with additional workshops run for Year 13 students and secondary teachers. From relief printing using cross-sections of trees, to Karl Blossfeldt-inspired mono-printed flowers and plants, to creating etching prints from their own photographs, our students embraced the various challenges with open minds and fantastic attitudes.

The theme 'Drawn to Life' was seen most dramatically in the year 9 and 13 workshops, where students studied real-life animal hearts and lungs before creating large scale experimental paintings using ink, charcoal and acrylic, in the style of Irish artist Chanelle Walshe. These paintings were complimented by the drawings of skulls and skeletons borrowed from the science department, as students considered the beautiful anatomical drawings of Leonard Da Vinci. All in all, this year's 'Big Draw' showcased a wonderful range of exploration and experimentation within the student's art work.
