Year 8 Geography Curriculum Initiatives – A Focus on 'Shanty Towns'

The Year 8 Geographers here at Madinat Khalifa have recently been following a unit on 'Population Dynamics' as part of the Geography Programme of Study. One part of this unit in particular, focused on the reasons for rural-to-urban migration and the subsequent development of shanty towns in developing or poorer nations (formerly known as LEDCs or Less Economically Developed Countries). Students were tasked with evaluating the pros and cons of the development of shanty towns; the impact on the shanty town dwellers along with the effects experienced by residents of the wider urban areas in which the shanty towns are located.

To utilise a range of VAK (Visual, Auditory and Kinesthetic), students were challenged with creating models of shanty towns. The students and staff really enjoyed creating these models, and the learning experience consolidated and stretched their holistic understanding of the issues surrounding shanty towns in developing countries. A huge thank you goes to Mr. Mackenzie and Ms. Lewis for planning and delivering such exciting and innovative Geography lessons.

'The Entrepeneurs'

Throughout Years 7-9 Enterprise students explored their creativity in designing their business and/or new innovative products. A range of ideas were designed which included new mobile phones, GPS apps, cafes and restaurants, food businesses, gaming, new hair machines, clothing businesses, new inventions and much more.

All students had a set of criteria to follow in order to 'pitch' their ideas. All participants demonstrated a confident approach, with some even composing their own jingles (singing, playing the guitar and beatboxing). Samples of the logos are below. 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Last week, 32 of our secondary students participated in a week-long residential visit at our Nord Anglia Education Expedition Centre at the foot of Mount Meru, Arusha, Tanzania. Activities included a safari, community work with a local Primary school and orphanage, trekking, team building and an appreciation of local culture and heritage. Students and staff from four NAE schools united to renovate Kitefu Primary School in Arusha.

Three classrooms were renovated and plans for further projects already underway.
