The Nord Anglia Middle East Regional Conference was held in Dubai last Friday with Principals and other senior staff, meeting at Nord Anglia's flagship school, for discussions about the development of educational partnerships across the UAE and Qatar.

Several new initiatives were announced which will see our children having the opportunity to collaborate both face to face and virtually to compete in competitions and joint ventures with children in other Nord Anglia schools around the world. Our exciting online shared space, Global Campus has been relaunched with a massive amount of new content specifically aimed at children of primary age. Teachers and students will be encouraged to explore this over the next few months both in class and at home.

There are several competitions for our children to enter this year, including the highly successful Short Story Competition which we won last year and the year before. So far the Education Team at Nord Anglia have received over 5000 entries for this year's competition and so it will be tough to hold onto our crown. Added to this there is also a competition for the best illustrator and a debating competition which we have entered two teams for.

The exciting collaboration between the Julliard School of Music and Performing Arts and Nord Anglia continues to grow. Staff from Julliard will be in Qatar in January to meet with our music team to see how they can assist us in developing an even more exciting music programme here.

We plan to develop some more local collaborations with our sister schools at Madinat Khalifa and Al Khor. We will be building on the existing sporting links to add music and technology partnerships to enhance the opportunities for our children. I came across this quote from Amy Poehler recently. "As you navigate through the rest of your life, be open to collaboration. Other people and other people's ideas are often better than your own. Find a group of people who challenge and inspire you, spend a lot of time with them, and it will change your life."

Amy Poehler is a well-known female comedian with wise words to say



about learning from others. No matter what your field, it helps to know what you're good at, but it also helps to recognise what others are good at. If you surround yourself with people that inspire you and people who can help you achieve goals, you become even better at what you do. This is what we are determined to do. We want our students to have the best opportunities through maximising the value of being part of a group of 42 international schools.

As we draw to the end of 2015 it is a good time to reflect on the progress of the schools at Rayyan and Gharaffa and to look forward to 2016. I will be taking a little time to do this in next month's issue of the newsletter and will have some exciting news about future plans both locally and for Nord Anglia Education in general.
