By offering English at BIS Abu Dhabi, we aim for our students to read easily, fluently and with good understanding; develop the habit of reading widely and often, for both pleasure and information; acquire a wide vocabulary, an understanding of grammar and knowledge of linguistic conventions for reading, writing and spoken language; write clearly, accurately and coherently, adapting their language and style in and for a range of contexts, purposes and audiences and use discussion in order to learn and elaborate clearly their understanding and ideas
