Your Option Choices

This booklet contains information about the course choices available to Year 10 students from August 2020 at BIS Hanoi and many of which of these choices will result in an official IGCSE qualification.

After the Year 9 Parents' Evening, your son/daughter will be asked to make their final choices for their IGCSE options.

In choosing students should think carefully about the following points:

- What do I enjoy?
- What am I good at?
- What do I need for future IB Diploma Programme choices?
- Do I have a balance of subjects?

BIS Hanoi has created a flexible programme of study for its Key Stage 4 students. All students are required to study Mathematics, Science, English, Physical Education and Life Skills.

Your Learning Foundation

You will study Mathematics, English, Science and Asian language course. These courses will form your learning foundation.

- Core Mathematics or Extended Mathematics or Extended Mathematics plus Additional Mathematics
- English First Language and English Literature or English Second Language and English Literature
- Combined Science (single award), Combined Science (Double Award) or Triple Science
- Vietnamese First Language or Korean First Language or Vietnamese Studies (non-examined subjects)

Selecting a pathway that is right for you

Students can follow a variety of pathways in addition to their learning foundation. These pathways provide varying points of focus. For some students that focus is an academic one, for others it is a creative or balanced one. Other students can follow a path of 21st century skill development, whilst others can build a programme that combines elements of all of the above. Your pathway should be based on your interests, abilities and planned future career or study aspirations.

To build your learning pathway, select one subject from each of the following 3 option blocks.

(Please note that all options subjects are subject to numbers and timetable constraints)

You will notice that this year we are offering two new courses which can be selected by students in order to fully prepare them for IB study alongside their IGCSE courses. This could support your son/daughter with focusing their academic skills in a group of core subjects whilst also preparing for 21st century learning.

In addition to the above students will study Core PE and Life Skills. Life Skills helps the overall development of students. Topics covered include careers education, sex education, drugs education, citizenship, study skills and examination revision skills.

EAL

Students identified as requiring additional support with their English Language skills will commence Year 10 with EAL classes. These classes are designed to support these students with their English Language acquisition so that they can better access the curriculum in their GCSE subjects. This is a non-examined course and instead will help to build up the necessary speaking, listening, reading and writing skills that are required to access the IGCSE exam content.

Tier 3 EAL students can select the subject in either option block 2 or 3 providing them with 6 lessons per fortnight. Students in Tier 2 will attend EAL lessons in both option blocks, providing them with 12 lessons per fortnight. As their confidence and ability grows, students will leave EAL and graduate onto our 21st Century Skills course where they will continue to learn important and valuable skills for their futures.

Introduction

Cambridge IGCSE First Language English is designed for students whose mother tongue is English.

The course allows students to:

- develop the ability to communicate clearly, accurately and effectively when speaking and writing
- learn how to use a wide range of vocabulary, and the correct grammar, spelling and punctuation
- develop a personal style and an awareness of the audience being addressed.

Students are also encouraged to read widely, both for their own enjoyment and to further their awareness of the ways in which English can be used. Cambridge IGCSE First Language English also develops more general analysis and communication skills such as synthesis, inference, and the ability to order facts and present opinions effectively.

Co-ordinated Sciences

Examination Board and syllabus Number: 0654

Introduction

Double award Cambridge IGCSE Co-ordinated Sciences is taught by subject specialists, candidates learn how science is studied and practised plus they become aware that the results of scientific research can have both good and bad effects on individuals, communities and the environment. As well as focusing on the individual sciences, the syllabus enables candidates to better understand the technological world they live in and take an informed interest in science and scientific developments. The syllabus is aimed at candidates across a very wide range of attainments, and will allow them to show success over the full range of grades from A*A* to GG.

As well as focusing on the individual sciences, the syllabus enables candidates to better understand the technological world they live in and take an informed interest in science and scientific developments. The syllabus is more demanding than the Double award and requires students academically able to access this course.

The three individual sciences are studied separately but suitability for this will be determined by the Head of Department at the end of Year 9.

- Physics: CIE 0625

Art & Design

Examination Board and syllabus Number: 0400

Introduction

Cambridge IGCSE Art and Design is accepted by universities, art colleges and employers as evidence of experiences and skills in developing and producing a range of artefacts and designs showing visual knowledge and understanding along with critical and cultural awareness.

Art and Design complements literary, mathematical, scientific and factual subjects. It is especially concerned with the development of visual perception and aesthetics. The subject encourages visual communication and is a means of expressing ideas and feelings. A personal and independent perspective is encouraged at all times.

Successful Art and Design candidates gain lifelong skills, including:

- Confidence and enthusiasm as they develop technical skills in two and three dimensional form and composition
- The ability to identify and solve problems in visual and tactile forms
- How to develop ideas from initial attempts to final solutions.

- Understanding different forms of business organisations, the environments in which businesses operate and business functions such as marketing, operations and finance
- An appreciation of the critical role of people in business success
- Confidence to calculate and interpret business data
- Communication skills including the need to support arguments with reasons
- Ability to analyse business situations and reach decisions or judgements.

The syllabus provides both a foundation for further study at Cambridge International A Level and an ideal preparation for the world of work.

Computer Science

Examination Board and syllabus Number: 0478

Introduction

The Cambridge Computer Science syllabus encourages students to develop computational thinking and logical reasoning. Students will be presented with a variety of problems which require a computer to form the solution. Students will learn how to problem solve through algorithmic thinking and computer programming. The course will provide students with lifelong skills including:

- the ability to think logically and present solutions to a problem with the aid of computers
- an understanding of how computers can solve problems
- an understanding of the functions of computer systems and the role they play in organisations
- the ability to plan, design and implement a solution and accepting feedback from others

IGCSE Computer Science provides students with an understanding of programming as well as the use of hardware and software in organisations. These skills are appreciated by employers across the globe. There is a huge shortage of people who can 'code' and as such, employees with a good coding ability are highly sought after; the demand is extremely high.

Games, websites and mobile apps aren't developed by simply clicking a button. They are developed by people who can work collaboratively, problem solve, persevere, strive to develop the best, take on feedback and constantly evaluate one's own work. It is these skills and attributes which are very attractive to any employer in any industry.

Drama

Examination Board and Syllabus Number: 0411

Introduction

The Cambridge IGCSE Drama Syllabus is designed as a two-year course for examination at age 16-plus. Through practical and theoretical study, the Cambridge IGCSE Drama syllabus encourages students to understand and enjoy drama by:

- developing their performance skills, both individually and in groups
- understanding the role of actor, director and designer in creating a piece of theatre
- considering ways in which ideas and feelings can be communicated to an audience
- discovering the performance possibilities of plays and other dramatic stimuli
- devising dramatic material of their own.

For Cambridge IGCSE Drama, candidates take two compulsory components:

Component 1 (Written examination) and Component 2 (Coursework), and are eligible for the award of grades A* to G.

Components Weighting

Component 1 Written examination 2 hours 30 minutes

The questions on this paper relate to pre-release material which is sent to Centres in advance of the examination. This material consists of three stimuli and an extended extract from a play (or an abridged version of an entire play).

Candidates devise a piece of drama based on one of the three stimuli and study the extract from the play. The questions on the paper will require candidates to have engaged with the pre-release material from the perspective of actor, director and designer. The question paper is structured as follows:

- Section A (30 marks) Candidates answer 6–8 short-answer questions on the extract from the play (20 marks) and 2–4 questions on the drama devised from their chosen stimulus (10 marks).
- Section B (25 marks) Candidates answer one longer-answer question from a choice of three on the extract from the play.
- Section C (25 marks) Candidates answer one longer-answer question from a choice of three on the drama devised from their chosen stimulus.

Externally assessed. 40%

Component 2 Coursework

Candidates submit three pieces of practical work.

One individual piece (3–5 minutes): one performance of an extract from a play.

Two group pieces (maximum 15 minutes each): one performance of an extract from a play and one original devised piece.

Note: the stimuli on the pre-release material for Component 1 may not be used as a basis for the devised piece on Component 2.

The careers that directly use a drama qualification are wide and far ranging including careers in the television, theatre, directing and production. It is also a good background for someone looking at any creative career.

Economics

Introduction

Cambridge IGCSE Economics is accepted by universities and employers as proof of knowledge and understanding of economics. Successful Cambridge IGCSE Economics candidates gain lifelong skills, including:

- An understanding of economic theory, terminology and principles
- The ability to apply the tools of economic analysis
- The ability to distinguish between facts and value judgements in economic issues
- An understanding of, and an ability to use, basic economic numeracy and literacy
- The ability to take a greater part in decision-making processes in everyday life
- An understanding of the economies of developed and developing nations
- An excellent foundation for advanced study in economics.

Prior learning Candidates beginning this course are not expected to have studied economics previously. Progression Cambridge IGCSE Certificates are general qualifications that enable candidates to progress either directly to employment, or to proceed to further qualifications.

Candidates who are awarded grades C to A* in Cambridge IGCSE Economics are well prepared to follow courses leading to Cambridge International AS and A Level Economics, or the equivalent (i.e. IB Diploma Programme).

Geography

Examination Board and Syllabus Number: 0460

Introduction

Geography is a subject that combines very well with others in the curriculum and that aims to develop a range of transferable skills as well as breadth of knowledge. The Geography IGCSE course brings in current geographical concerns as well as a sound grounding in key ideas. Studying Geography at IGCSE will allow you to deepen your knowledge of a range of topics drawing from physical, human and environmental aspects of the discipline.

Course Outline

Geography helps you to make sense of the world around you. It is hands on, it is relevant and it is fun. We follow the Cambridge IGCSE Geography course which includes an interesting mix of topics such as urban issues, world development, resources and sustainability, extreme environments, rivers, and hazards to name but a few. The course will give you the chance to get to grips with some of the big questions which affect our world and understand the social, economic and physical forces and processes which shape and change our world. There are many ways of learning in Geography. It is very practical with opportunities to learn new skills such as modern computer based mapping (called GIS), map skills, interpreting photographs, fieldwork skills, presenting, role play and debating techniques. You will improve your literacy through your report writing and written work and make practical use of your numeracy skills when you interpret data and construct graphs.

A Place for Geography

You will become confident at handling a variety of data sources and develop competent decision making skills through the use of Geographical Information Systems (GIS). You will also understand the complexities of managing the environment and use your problem-solving skills to suggest and evaluate solutions to many problems facing our planet today.

Careers

Looking further into the future, the course provides an excellent basis for moving towards our new and exciting IB Diploma course and then onwards towards university. Geography students will be well rounded and well prepared for the challenge of The IB. The skills learnt in Geography are extremely transferable and link and support other academic subjects such as Mathematics and the core and applied Sciences. Here is a short list of careers that see Geography as an important qualification to have in the job market: Accountant, Business Owner, Architect, Fashion Designer, Doctor, Lawyer, Urban Planner, Teacher, Geochemist. In short, every job needs a good Geographer!

History

Introduction

Cambridge IGCSE is accepted by universities and employers worldwide as providing proof of historical knowledge and understanding as well as analysis and evaluation skills.

The History syllabus offers students the opportunity to study some of the major international issues of the 20th century, by exploring seven key historical questions:

- 1. Were the peace treaties of 1919–23 fair?
- 2. To what extent was the League of Nations a success?
- 3. Why had international peace collapsed by 1939?
- 4. Who was to blame for the Cold War?
- 5. How effectively did the USA contain the spread of Communism?
- 6. How secure was the USSR's control over Eastern Europe, 1948-c.1989?

Students also complete an **in-depth study** on Germany looking in greater detail at the demise of democracy in the Weimar Republic and the rise of Hitler and the Third Reich.

The emphasis within the syllabus is as much on developing lifelong historical skills as on acquiring knowledge. Successful candidates gain valuable skills including:

- an interest in and enthusiasm for learning and understanding about the past
- an understanding of historical concepts such as cause and consequence, continuity and change, and similarity and difference
- an appreciation of historical evidence and how to use it
- a greater understanding of international issues and inter-relationships
- how to present clear, logical arguments.

Music

Introduction

The Cambridge IGCSE Music Syllabus is designed as a two-year course for examination at age 16-plus. The aims of the syllabus are to:

- enable candidates to acquire and consolidate a range of basic musical skills, knowledge and understanding, through the activities of listening, performing and composing
- help candidates develop a perceptive, sensitive and critical response to the main historical periods and styles of Western music
- help candidates to recognise and understand the music of various non-Western traditions, and thus to form an appreciation of cultural similarities and differences
- provide a foundation for the development of an informed appreciation of music
- provide a foundation for further study in music at a higher level.

With grades C to A*, candidates are well prepared to follow courses leading to Level 3 qualifications such as GCE AS and A Level Music, IB Music or the Cambridge International AS and A Level Music.
