



Dear Parents and Friends

In this, my last message of the year, it is inevitably a time to look back and reflect on the year. At the beginning of the year, we began to use the phrase 'the BSB family'; there is always a risk that we use terms like this too much but I have to say it has taken on real resonance. We are a family; I believe that one of our strengths is that we treat every child and every parent as an individual, as one of our own.

First and foremost I want to thank that BSB family for the amazing and warm welcome you have extended to my family and me. Lucy, Eli and I could not be happier being here, and that is thanks to so many of you. We feel part of the community and hope that we will stay for many years to come.



Looking back over the past academic year, I do believe that the school has made massive progress in so many fields. The focus on academic standards has been number one on the agenda, and I could not be more proud of the success we have achieved. I am genuinely excited to receive the IGCSE and A-Level results in August this year, which will be the validation of this success. We are truly proud to be a school that does not have selection tests on entry, because we believe our teachers have the skills to make sure that your child will achieve more here than in any other school, and I believe that these results will show this. With our focus on this type of academic achievement, next year we will go from strength to strength. Last year, approximately 250 pupils took part in regular sport outside of curriculum time; this year it has been 579.

We have had a chance to thank them publicly in assemblies and some meetings with parents, but now is my chance to thank them formally. I think the commitment and dedication of my colleagues is second to none, the care they show for individual students and their willingness to go the extra mile quite

exceptional, and their capacity to relentlessly seek improvement in everything we do remarkable. For those colleagues who are now leaving this team, we will miss you. You have left your own mark on BSB and I hope you leave with many joyful memories and I wish you every possible success in the future.

Being a family is also about the type of people our students become, and the way they contribute to the wider community. Amongst all the things that I want to celebrate, this is the one which daily inspires me and motivates me more than any other. I said at the beginning of the year that I believed I have the best job in the world. As I have got to know these amazing individuals better, I am now even more convinced! Young people and education are my twin passions, and the young people of BSB lift us all to new heights of belief every day. They have committed themselves to the school wholeheartedly, given their best, and recognised the value of hard work and academic commitment. But, above all else, they have understood that it is within their power to make the world a better place, and have shown this in their interactions with others, both within school and in the wider community.

May I end by wishing you all a wonderful summer, wherever that may be, and every success for the new academic year, whether at BSB or as you move on to pastures new.


FROM THE HEAD OF SECONDARY


STUDENTS GO THE DISTANCE IN MATHS

How far away something is when you can't actually go there? Year 8 Mathematicians faced this problem of mapping space during BSB's Science and Engineering Week last week. It's a question you cannot get wrong if you want to travel to Mars or go on a Star Trek. They tackled it by triangulation, taking angles from points a known distance apart. They used a high precision telescope from the spectrometer to measure to the nearest 1/60 of a degree and got fantastic results. Well done Year 8!

Year 7 were asked "How many blades of (plastic) grass are there on the field?". Instead of spending years counting every one and getting in the way of the football games they took sample areas and multiplied up. So how many? We estimated that there were 1.1 Billion...nearly as many as the number of people in China! They extended the idea to find out how many deadly mosquitos in a swarm (sadly some students were too slow and "died" in agony) and how many stars in the sky...... About 100 000 000 000 000 000 ooo ooo ooo oolooloo!

FUN TIMES DURING SCIENCE AND ENGINEERING WEEK

This year saw the first Science & Engineering Week at BSB, which was organised by Ms Hemming in the Science Department and involved the Maths, DT, Art and English departments. It was a truly cross-curricular event and a lot of fun for students.

There were trips to the Beijing Zoo throughout the week, and two lunchtime clubs every day demonstrating various scientific phenomena. Year 8 spent a whole day solving their engineering challenge of making a machine that times 60 seconds precisely. During Science lessons, students in Years 7-9 built bridges, towers, and roller coasters and competed with each other for the best design.

In the Maths department, students did a number of activities such as sampling techniques for estimating high numbers, measuring height using clinometers, using software to draw cooling curves, and "Monte Carlo Maths". (Also see Mr Mason's article on the previous page.)

In DT, students were asked to build a self-powered "green" car and competitions were held for furthest, fastest, and best design. In English lessons, students investigated the Elizabethan belief in "humours", seen in the literature of the day, and how this influenced medicine and science. In Art lessons, students drew modern-day inventions in the style of Leonardo da Vinci.

Students and staff alike had a great week and we are already looking forward to next year!

Parents and students enjoyed an evening of Music, Art and Drama at the Secondary school's annual Soirée on Thursday 12th June.


The evening began with drama students standing on small tables and performing soliloquies to the audience as they milled around the school foyer looking at some amazing artwork from IGCSE and A-Level students.

YEAR 3 RESIDENTIAL

This is a well-established trip and is the first time that children from BSB experience leaving Beijing and staying away from home as a year group, clearly marking the children's firm transition into Key Stage 2.

Our trip is three days and two night and although one of the shortest residential we certainly pack a lot into a short space of time. Please read on to hear about the fun and adventures we had this year, with the 5 Year 3 BSB classes and for the first time Klasse 2 from the German Primary School.

<u>Day 1-Wednesday 11th June.</u> The children arrived at school in the usual way although this time laden down with their suitcases. After checking everyone was present a correct the Wulingshan bags and hats we handed out, packed lunches collected and hugs and kisses goodbye exchanged. We were off to our first stop the Great Wall of China and Mutianyu where we were all going to walk the wall!

The sun was beaming and after arriving a spitting into two halves, we were off to explore. One half of us ventured to the caves and rock museum first, stopping to collect our precious gems on the way. The other half took on the challenge of climbing to the top of the wall. We met in the middle and swapped stories and before swapping paths. Many of the children fond the climb challenging and would have preferred the cable car option but they preserved and were rewarded with blue skies and perfect views of the wall for miles at the top. Back at the bottom we all met up for a well-deserved ice cream before heading off from some souvenir shopping.

This was great chance to practice our Chinese and our bargaining skills. The vendors were very impressed by the children's persistence and regularly told me what great teachers we were. Back on the bus and it was off to Wulingshan and the Moon Lake Hotel. When we arrived we waved goodbye to the buses checked into our rooms.

We were treated to lots of delicious dishes and were sure to thank the staff in Chinese. Back in our rooms we got showered and changed ready for Quiz night, many of us opted to wear our Wulingshan jumpers as night mountain air brought with it a bit of chill. After gruelling quiz led by Mr Stewart, we were treated to a bed time story from Mrs Witte and it was off to bed.

Day 2- Thursday 12th June. The second day started brilliant and early very early for many as lots of the children could not contain their excitement and were up and dressed by 6am! Wake up was not until 7am so this gave the children more than enough time to start working on the tidiest room challenge. We gathered together for breakfast at 8am and were treated to lots of dumplings, noodles, cake and bread and jam. After breakfast it was time to collect our fruit snack pack our bags with hats, water and extra sun-cream and the together for the first challenge of the day the walk to the waterfall!

We were collected by minibuses and driven up to the bottom of the mountain, after which we set off into the nature reserves with our eyes firmly on the prize. We enjoyed a beautiful water crossing over the mountain river and enjoying the dramatic heights of the rocks and strange faces and images we could spot in their cracks and crags. When we finally reached the waterfall it was a sight to behold and the force of the water provide and refreshing cool spray that we all enjoyed. Miss Simon, Mr Marr and Mr Stewart took on the ice water challenge to see who could stand it for the longest- Mr Stewart reigned supreme.

- A visit to a local school in Xi'an
- Bartering at the local Muslim shopping quarter
- The excavation of pottery from the Han dynasty
- A tour of the mausoleum of Emperor Liu Qi
- A visit to the Tang Dynasty dance show
- A visit to the Shan Xi history museum

The children had a fantastic time and had opportunities to learn so much about our recent topic, Imperial China. Visits to the terracotta army brought the learning of ancient history to life and the chance to excavate, study ancient pictures and ask questions meant that the children were learning about history in the very best way possible. Additionally, residential visits provide so much opportunity for personal growth: to be away from the family and to experience that level of independence, to see how school is for local children and to make friends in unfamiliar environments, to barter (hard!); these are life skills worth having!
