As we are sure you can all appreciate, virtual school is particularly challenging for the specialist teachers of practical subjects, so we do appreciate their dedication to making their lessons as accessible and purposeful as possible online.

Here's 'a look at learning in music' from Mr Brent:

Students are improving their musical understanding during music class as they work on a variety of tasks that challenge their performing, creating and listening skills. Music ECAs have begun for students in Year 2 and above. Lessons are 20 minutes long and are either one-to-one or a maximum of three students depending upon demand and stage of development. The range of instruments currently being taught are: voice, piano, violin, guitar, ukulele, drums, recorder and GarageBand. The commitment toward learning music is outstanding and the students should be proud of their positive attitude!

Year 3's Dinosaur Poems



Just before the holidays, Year 3 children produced some great poems as part of their learning in English linked to their theme of 'Dinosaurs'.

Each lesson began by reading a dinosaur poem and then discussing its features. At the start of the week, the children reviewed their understanding of alliteration and wrote some super sentences about dangerous dinosaurs before starting to write poems.

The focus for their poetry writing was to use amazing, alliterative adjectives to go with precise nouns. Ms Emma and Ms Melissa also encouraged the children to use their senses to imagine what they might have been able to see, smell and hear in those dinosaur days. The challenge for writing the final line of the poems was to use adverbs and creative verbs. Other skills involved in this unit of learning were: learning how to edit; performing the poems using a loud, clear voice and actions.
